Mrs. King was a devoted wife and mother, a kind neighbor and friend and will be greatly missed by those who knew her best. The funeral was held at the home Monday afternoon at 1.30 o'clock. The services were conducted by Rev. I. A. Ranney, pastor of the M. E. church. Rev. W. A. Warner, pastor of the Congregational church offered prayer. Burial was in the Welcome O. Brown cemetery.
