NINE DIE IN COLLISION.

One of Worst Railroad Accidents in Vermont for Years.

Seven killed outright and as many injured, most of them seriously, is the toll resulting from a head-on collision on June 5, in the tunnel north of Burlington between a wrecking engine on the way to Winooski and the Burlington and Lamoille train from Cambridge Junction.

The accident was due to a mistake or misunderstanding in train orders at Winooski.

The injured were removed to Mary Fletcher hospital in the police and other local ambulances. As the two engines came together the steam pipes burst and the men were scalded badly.

Two of the injured later died, making a total of nine deaths. The tunnel was dark and electric lights had to be strung before the rescue work could be carried on. The state has never had but one or two worse railroad accidents.

James Dow, a former resident of Barton died Friday, June 7, at the home of James Calderwood in South Albany, where he was being cared for. The deceased was born in Ryegate Aug. 2, 1832, the son of Samuel and Jeannette Dow.

He was married in Greensboro to Florilla Randall, who died leaving two sons, George and Charlie, the latter dying in 1890.

In 1886 he married Mrs. Clara Slack Wells and lived in West Glover for several years, later moving to Barton.

Registration of German Alien Females.

All natives, denizens, or subjects of the German Empire or of the German Imperial Government, being FEMALES of the age of 14 years or upwards, now within the United States and not actually naturalized as American Citizens, are required to register as German Alien Females.

The registration is fixed within the Vermont Judicial district to commence at 6 a. m. Monday, June 17th, 1918, and to continue on each day successively thereafter, except Sunday, June 23d, 1918, between the hours of 6 a. m. and 8 p. m., up to and including Wednesday, the 26th day of June, 1918, at 8 o'clock p. m.

The details of registration will be attended to by local postmasters in towns of less than 5000 population; and blanks and information furnished by them to the registrars.

All persons required to register should understand that in so doing they are giving proof of their peaceful dispositions and their intention to conform to the laws of the United States, but those failing to register as provided in the rules and regulations are subject to severe penalties.

Names of All Registrants of This Class in County and Summary by Towns.

The number of new registrants under the regulation making all young men who have become 21 years of age since a year ago, liable for military service and who registered in Orleans county on June 5, is 162.
