If you want a useful souvenir from the Vermont Fish and Game Department keep a record of the game you see or take between Oct. 1, 1919 and May 1, 1920.

This department is trying to take a census of the game birds and animals, fur bearing animals and vermin of the state and needs your help in taking the same. If you live or hunt in Orleans County send a post card at once to County Warden, C. H. Atkins, Orleans, Vt., and request him to send you a blank on which to make your record. All records should be kept on these blanks which are to be returned to the County Warden immediately after May 1, 1920.

After the blank is returned a useful souvenir will be sent you from the Fish and Game Department. Your record is needed whether you hunt and trap extensively or only a little. Send for record blank at once.

A chicken-pie supper given in Lyndonville for the benefit of the new hospital there netted about \$300, which will be used for the purchase of linen, surgical dressings, etc., for the sick room. A house in Lyndonville has been converted into a hospital capable of accommodating 25 patients at a time.
