### BARTON CELEBRATION AND PAGEANT

July 1 to 4 A Big Event in Barton. Aeroplane, Pageant, Baseball, Parades, Etc.

The outstanding feature of the 125th anniversary celebration at Barton, July 1-4, will be a great out-door historical pageant, staged near the outlet of "May" brook into Crystal Lake.

From early realistic Indian scenes to the final patriotic World War scene the high points in Barton's history will be depicted with a local cast of 300 people in 10 episodes and dance interludes, the event costing more than \$3000 to produce. Col. Barton, Gen. Lafayette, the smugglers of 1812, the Civil war heroes, the merry-makers of the old-time husking bee and the G. A. R. as they pass the old flag to the American Legion, all will take their place in turn upon the woodland stage, each group and character clothed in special costumes of the period they represent.

Because Barton possesses a municipal electric plant it has been possible to obtain the illuminating specialist of the General Electric company to do the evening lighting. Fountains, fire, smoke torches and changing rainbow hues upon the dancers will be special features, while the historic scenes will be lighted by immense floods such as were used at the Panama exposition.

Nothing of like magnitude has ever been attempted in this part of the state and all the latest scientific has produced will be combined to make this lighting a thing of exquisite beauty.

The pageant is written and produced by Miss Imogene Phipps Hogle of Boston, with Miss Madeline Randall of St. Johnsbury directing the dancing and Mr. Cogan of the General Electric company as lighting manager.

The pageant will be staged Friday, Saturday and Monday nights, July 1, 2 and 4 at 8 o'clock and Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Besides the pageant there will be a full program Saturday and Monday. On Saturday there will be airplane exhibits and passenger carrying by the Burke, Jones, Salisbury Aero Corporation of Randolph, the only Vermont flying organization. They will fly to Barton a new \$7500 exhibition plane. There will be band concerts, baseball, parades and other features. The program on Monday, the Fourth, consists of baseball at 10 o'clock, concerts, parades, pageant presentations, etc.

### Pageant Notes

Pageant rehearsals are going on daily. In fact several rehearsals are put on each day, forenoon, afternoon and evening. The characters for the different episodes and groups meet together in Alumni hall or other convenient places to work on their scenes and real progress is noted.

Miss Madeline Randall, in charge of the dancing, has arrived, and Mr. Cogan of the General Electric company of Boston has been in town to make arrangements for the lighting. Everything is moving rapidly and smoothly.

About 200 people, all to be in the cast, met at Alumni hall Friday evening when Miss Hogle explained the pageant, assigned times for rehearsals of the various groups and different parts of the committee gave short talks about their work; Mrs. J. F. Batchelder for the cast costume committee, Miss Marion Redfield for the dance committee, and others.

The splendid cooperation of the people is a most pleasing thing to Miss Hogle and the committee to do what they can for the event, giving of their time and talent, giving the use of cars, teams labor and whatever may be necessary to help. This is not membership in the pageant and what makes a successful pageant is necessary now will be looked upon with pride after the big event has been brought to a successful close on July 4.

Promptness at rehearsals is essential, as one or two belated persons in a group not only hinders that group but groups that rehearse later, and with a cast numbering more than 300, divided into more than a dozen groups, there must be precision.

It has been decided to make the presentation on Friday night, July 1, "Children's night," every child being admitted free. After that no differential charge will be made for children; but adults. But every child from Barton, Orleans, Glover, Irasburg, Brownington, Newport and every other place will be admitted free. The historical features of the event will be decidedly worth while to every child.

### MUNICIPAL COURT

Judge W. M. Wright of Barton held a session of the municipal court on Monday afternoon and the following cases were heard and disposed of.

Philip Paradis of Irasburg, charged with the theft of a watch, had a jury trial. The case was of special interest and there were many witnesses from Irasburg present. During the trial information for receiving stolen goods was also furnished. The jury brought in a verdict of guilty of receiving and disposing of stolen goods. The sentence being not less than five or over six months at the house of correction with costs of prosecution. The execution of the prison sentence was suspended and Paradis was placed in the hands of the probation officer. States attorney Albert Farman prosecuted the case and Judge E. J. Smith was Paradis' attorney.

Adelma Choquette of Newport Center received a fine of \$5.00 and costs for intoxication.

T. H. Savaria of Troy was given a fine of \$5.00 and costs for intoxication. He also was fined \$100.00 and costs for operating an automobile while under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

This paper of last week reported Wesley Chase as receiving a fine of \$5.00 and costs for operating a car while intoxicated. This was an error as Judge Wright is not letting such offenders of the law off with less than a \$100 fine. The sentence of Chase was with held for the time being.
