

members of such association may agree upon, and shall have perpetual succession, and they and their successors may hold such real and personal property, rights and interests, as they may hereafter acquire by purchase, gift or otherwise, and may alien, sell and transfer the same according to law, as they may deem proper for the benefit of said associations.

Sec. 2. That all associations formed under this act, shall for ever hereafter be capable in law to sue and be sued, impleaded and be impleaded, answer and defend in all courts of law and equity, and shall enjoy all privileges incident to corporations of similar character, may appoint all such officers as they may deem proper, may regulate their election and designate their duties and authority, may make their own by-laws and regulations, and alter the same at the will and pleasure of a majority.

Provided, That by laws and regulations of said corporations shall not be repugnant to the constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 3. That the form of the original agreement for constituting such associations shall be as follows:—  
The undersigned, inhabitants of county of State of Vermont, do hereby voluntarily associate for the purpose of according to the first section of an act entitled "an act incorporating literary and scientific associations," passed November sixteenth, Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six.

In witness whereof we have hereto severally set our hands,  
Dated at this day of in the year of our Lord  
Which said agreement, after being duly executed, shall be recorded in the clerk's office in the county where such association may be formed, and notice thereof duly published in some newspaper in this state, to be designated by said clerk.

Sec. 4. That all associations so formed as aforesaid, shall not be empowered by the provisions of this act to hold real estate, by gift, purchase or otherwise, exceeding in value and amount the sum of ten thousand dollars.

Sec. 5. That all associations formed under this act, shall be under the control of any future legislative legislature, who shall have full power to alter, amend, or repeal this act.

Approved, November 16, 1836.

An act relating to the members of the General Assembly.

It is hereby enacted, That the members of this and every future Legislature shall be, and they are hereby authorized and empowered to receive ten cents for every mile's travel, in going to and returning from the legislature of this state.

Sec. 2. That the act entitled "an act directing the mode of ascertaining the mileage of the members of the General Assembly," passed November sixth, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four, be, and the same is, hereby repealed.
