

false, and I am much at a loss to know how his map could have obtained the name of "official," for certainly it is only an official deception to favor the British claim. This map is called by Mr. Buchanan No. 2.

Pursuing northerly on the line, 58 1/2 miles is the River Listook. (improperly called Ristook and Aroostook). To substantiate this fact I will here observe that two aged Indian Chiefs were with me at this River, who both asserted that the only and true Indian name was "Listook." The line crosses this river 3 miles east of the St. John, and about 5, following the course of the river. About half a mile east of the line is an extensive fall, and west of the line the river is navigable with flat boats for considerable distance. The river "To bique," which has been frequently mentioned in the papers, falls in the east side of the St. John about 1 1/2 miles below the Listook.

The line crosses the St. John at 77 1/2 miles and about 3 miles above the Grand Falls in that river. At 144 Miles 26 Chains is the summit of the Ridge of Highlands which divide the rivers that empty into the River St. Lawrence from those which fall into the Atlantic Ocean. I partially examined this ridge of highlands for about 70 miles. It extended nearly west for about 50 miles, and thence South westerly about 250 miles, to the head of Connecticut river, no part of which has ever been properly explored, and the submission to the King of the Netherlands was made with this extraordinary omission.

The Rivers which extend southerly from the dividing ridge and fall into the Atlantic Ocean, are the Ristgouch, which falls into the Bay Chaleur, the St. John which falls into the Bay of Fundy, the Kennebec which falls into Merry meetingbay, and the Androscoggin, which falls into the same bay. The Rivers which run northerly from the dividing ridge and fall into the River St. Lawrence are Metis, Ramouski, Trois Pistoles, Vert, Dulup, Camaraska, Owell, St. Thomas, Chaudier, and many streams of less note. All of which, except the Chaudier, are very short, in consequence of the dividing ridge being near the St. Lawrence.

Steele, of Dorchester county, were appointed delegates on the part of the legislature, to the National Whig Convention, which is to meet at Harrisburg, in December next to nominate a candidate for the Presidency. These gentlemen it is understood, go into the convention pledged to the support of any particular candidate, although their first preference, we have heard is decidedly and warmly for Mr. Clay.



GENERAL ORDER, No. 3.  
In order fully to carry into effect the Act "For the regulation and government of the Militia," passed in Nov. 1827; the organization established, and the regulations prescribed by the report of the Board of Officers, under that Act, which were approved by the Commander in Chief on the 11th of October, 1828;—and more especially for the information and government of Independent Companies, to enable them to conform to the Act, under the provisions of the above Act; it is found necessary, to establish and cause to be observed the following

REGULATIONS.  
1. Arms of the State.—The object, in the provision of the statute for the distribution of the arms of the State, was, evidently, encouragement to Independent Companies, by furnishing an inducement for their formation, efficiency in point of numbers, and uniformity in appearance. Companies formed, consequently, without having in view the principles upon which the Act was based, must be ineffective and subversive of the object. Private arms, therefore, in any application for arms, to the Commander in Chief,

1st. Such Companies will be formed under the provisions of the organization established.

2d. They will consist of not less than sixty men enrolled liable to do military duty, and fully uniformed according to the regulations prescribed by the Board.

3d. A certificate of the organization of the Company, of the number of the men enrolled liable to do military duty, and of the number fully uniformed, signed by the Commander of the Regiment, will be transmitted with such application to the Commander in Chief.

Commandants of Regiments will forthwith cause due search to be made for such pieces of ordnance, belonging to the State, as may be found at large, or neglected, by reason of the disbanding of any Company of Artillery, or from any other cause, and cause the same to be properly housed and secured, and report the same to Generals of Brigades. They will also make reports to Generals of Brigades, on or before the 10th of April next, of the number of pieces of ordnance belonging to the State, within their respective Regiments, the caliber and condition of each, and to what Company each is apportioned, or, if at large, where situated.

And Brigadier Generals will see that the above regulation is strictly complied with, and they will forward the returns so reported to this Department, to be transmitted to the Department of the Quarter Master General.

2. Regimental Courts Martial.—Commandants of Regiments will hold the regimental courts martial, required by law, for the collection of fines, in their several Regiments within the month of June next, in order to meet the demands upon the Treasury of the State; and they will make complete returns of their respective Regiments to Head Quarters of Brigade on, or before the first day of July next following. Brigadier Generals will report all Field Officers who shall not comply with the above regulation. Brigadier Generals will also make returns of the Regiments in their Brigades, on or before the 15th day of July next, to this Department, whence they will be transmitted to Generals of Division.

3. Enrollments.—From the returns made to this Department, immediately previous to the present organization, it is apparent that the provisions of the Act, relative to enrollments have not been complied with. Commandants of Regiments will, therefore, report to Generals of Brigades all failures, by Commandants of Companies, to enroll, and cause to be warned, every citizen liable to do military duty, previous to the first Tuesday of June next; and all delinquencies of duty enjoined by the eighteenth, nineteenth and twentieth of the "Rules and Articles" for the government of the Militia of this State.

4. Discipline.—By the Constitution of the United States, the authority is reserved to the States respectively, of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress; and by the Act of Congress of May, 1820, the system of discipline which is and shall be ordered to be observed by the regular army of the United States, shall also be observed by the militia in their exercise and discipline through the United States. The system, therefore, of "Infantry Tactics, including exercises and manœuvres of Light Infantry and Riflemen for the use of the United States," published by the Department of War, under the authority of an Act of Congress of the 2nd March, 1828, is received, adopted and established as the rules of discipline for the Militia of this State, until further orders.

From the above regulations, it will be understood by every officer of the militia, that the practice of neglecting, or diverting themselves of, and assuming again, at their pleasure, the responsibilities of their office, however lightly esteemed those responsibilities may be, cannot be permitted. And, although repeatedly unsuccessful, as they express themselves to have been, in obtaining the encouragement which they claim, let them, by a promptness and faithfulness in the discharge of their duties, evince the consciousness to be theirs, of having justly merited it.
