Washington, Nov. 29. Commodore Dupont reports that Fort Pulaski is at the mercy of our forces the moment the latter desire to take it. Also reliable accounts received here that Savannah was being evacuated by the people as fast as possible, fearing probably that Commodore Rogers would attempt to take it. He further states that Commodore Farrall, of the rebel fleet, has given it as his opinion that the entire rebel defenses of the Southern Country must be abandoned, as they could not stand the armament of our fleet.

There is reason to believe that the rebel steamer George Page captured two merchant schooners at the mouth of Quantico Creek last night. Com. Craven, flag officer of the Potomac fleet, has been ordered to the command of the Brooklyn at Philadelphia.

New York, Nov. 30. The Tribune's Washington dispatch says that government received intelligence yesterday that the leaders of the rebellion in Richmond and in the rebel camp across the Potomac, at last are satisfied that they are to be beaten in the issue of arms which they have made, and that the cause of secession is a hopeless one.

Baltimore, Nov. 30. The Old Point boat has arrived. There were many rumors relative to affairs at Pensacola. One story is that Fort Pickens had been taken by the rebels. Another was that Fort Pickens was victorious and Gen. Bragg was killed.

Baltimore, Nov. 30. The Pensacola Observer of the 22d, says that five monitors just 10 o'clock this morning, heavy and continuous firing commenced at the Forts below. Which side commenced it we are unable yet to say.

LATER. We learn from a person just arrived from the Navy Yard that the firing was opened by Fort Pickens upon the Confederate steamer Times, and was returned by our batteries and forts.

The United States steamer Niagara is trying across the bar for the purpose of entering the harbor. The excitement in town is intense, and the houses are closed and the tops of houses covered with an excited population.

The Richmond Dispatch says official dispatch from Gen. Bragg state that everything remains quiet at Pensacola, and that the Federals keep at a safe distance from his guns. No fighting stated in the paper.

Louisville, Nov. 30. Passengers from the Southern points represent that there is an almost universal reign of terror throughout the rebel States. The steamer Ocean Queen, from Port Royal, S. C., has arrived. She brings only a small number of troops.

Gen. Dupont and Gen. Sherman had just returned in the steamer McClellan to Hilton Head having landed a force of marines on Tybee Island, who commenced repairing the fortifications and building new ones.

There is a report that two vessels belonging to the rebel fleet were in the Savannah River, and that they were endeavoring to prevent our fleet from going to that point.

Eight gunboats were at anchor off Tybee to cover our troops in case of necessity.

A small schooner had been sent up to one of the forts above Hilton Head to load cotton and mail in a few days by order of the authorities.
