

TRUE BORDER STATE UNIONISM. In the House of Representatives, Thursday, after some Copperhead resolutions of the improved conservative proslavery variety, had been tabled by a vote of 90 to 66, Green Clay Smith of Kentucky introduced the following unequivocal Union resolution:

Resolved, That as our country and the very existence of the best Government ever instituted by man, is imperiled by the most senseless and wicked rebellion that the world has ever seen, and believing as we do that the only hope of saving the country and preserving this Government is by the power of the sword, we are for the most vigorous prosecution of the war until the Constitution and laws shall be enforced and obeyed in all parts of the United States, and to that end we oppose any armistice, or intervention, or mediation, or proposition for peace from any quarter so long as there shall be found a rebel in arms against the Government; and we ignore all party names, lines and issues, and recognize but two parties in this war—patriots and traitors.

This resolution was passed by a vote of 93 to 64. Mr. Smith also introduced the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we hold it to be the duty of Congress to pass all necessary bills to supply men and money, and the duty of the people to render every aid in their power to the constituted authorities of the Government in crushing out the rebellion.

Resolved, That our thanks are tendered to our soldiers in the field for their gallantry in defending and upholding the flag of the Union, and defending the great principles dear to every American patriot.

These resolutions were passed, the first by a vote of 152 to 1, the second by 166 to 1. Benjamin G. Harris, a secessionist of Maryland, only voting in the negative each time.

COLORED SOLDIERS MURDERED BY THE REBELS. In June last a company of colored soldiers, comprising a captain, first lieutenant and eighty men, were captured at Milliken's Bend, during the siege at Vicksburg, after a brave resistance. "Since their captivity," says the New York Post, "their fate has been involved in profound mystery. Nothing official could be learned of them, and from the well known vindictiveness of the rebel military authorities the worst was apprehended. Information has been received at the War Department, by way of Texas, stating that these apprehensions were too well founded. It appears that the prisoners were conveyed into the country several miles and placed in close confinement. No intimation of their fate was given them. After several days the two officers were taken out at dead of night, and the word given out that they had escaped. It now appears that they were hanged without previous notice or even a semblance of trial, in obedience to a secret order from the rebel Secretary of War. A few days afterward the other prisoners also disappeared mysteriously, and there is no doubt that they were secretly murdered by direction of the Richmond authorities. What retaliation shall be inflicted for these most barbarous atrocities is yet to be determined.

A young lady in Richmond, writing to her friends in Baltimore, says that the gaities of society in that city consist chiefly of what are called "starvation parties," at which people meet in each other's houses and have music and dancing, but nothing to eat or drink. The fair writer attends these parties twice a week, and she avers that they have a good deal of fun but no supper.

The Richmond Why of the 9th says: "In Danville five dollars in gold were sold at auction a day or two ago for one hundred and forty dollars in Confederate notes."

A MAN CARRIED OVER NIAGARA FALLS. The Toronto Leader relates that on Monday last a Buffalo steam tug with two scows in tow got too far into the current of Niagara river, just above the falls, for the head of steam on, and the captain and crew of four men becoming alarmed leaped overboard and struck for the shore. The captain and three men succeeded in getting to land, but the fourth man sunk beneath the leaping and boiling waters and was carried over the awful cataract. Some men in one of the scows were rescued by two boatmen who put off in a skiff to their assistance. The tug and one scow went over the falls, but the other scow struck on a rock just before the brink, and remains there.

For the Freeman. Report of County Court Cases. Caledonia County Court, December Term, A. D., 1863.

HON. L. P. POLAND, Presiding. Frederick F. Bridgman vs. town of Greensboro. This was an action on the case for an injury to the plaintiff's horse, alleged to have been received on the highway, in said town, leading from East Hardwick to Barton, on Sunday night, May 26, 1861.

The plaintiff claimed, and his testimony tended to show, that he was driving a pair of horses at the time and place named, when one of them stepped through a defective bridge and fell down and was lamed thereby for several months so as to be unfit for service.

In the opening, the plaintiff was the only witness called to prove that any injury occurred at this place. The plaintiff testified that two men came up behind him at the time, and that one of them assisted him in getting up his horse; that he supposed this man to be one Thompson, an acquaintance of his at Barton, but that Thompson had been subsequently seen by him, and proved not to be the man. His defendant then gave evidence tending to show that the bridge had no such defect in it as that described by plaintiff, and that plaintiff's horse was not lamed there, but was lamed prior to the time of the alleged injury.

The plaintiff then called in reply, one Elbridge Hutton, of Lyndon, who testified that he was the man who came up behind the plaintiff at the time and place named, and fully confirmed all the testimony of plaintiff, as to the injury there. He testified that one Mose Sawyer was with witness and that Sawyer helped the plaintiff out of his difficulty. That Sawyer was of Topsham, Vt., but that he had gone into the 10th Regiment of Vermont volunteers.

The witness testified that he had seen the plaintiff repeatedly since the occurrence, but had never told him of what he knew about it, except to say to him in January last, that "perhaps he could be of service to him," nor disclosed these facts to any one but his own wife, until plaintiff called on him with an officer and subpoena, at Lyndon, on the evening after the plaintiff had testified in opening his case, at this term of the court.

It was the finding of this long sought witness to this point, by such marvellous good fortune that imparted to the case an interest almost dramatic.

Verdict for plaintiff. Damages \$93.00. Bartlett & Burke for plaintiff. Davis, Redfield & Colby, for defendant.

Frederick P. Bridgman vs. town of Hardwick.

This, also, was an action on the case for damages to the plaintiff's person, alleged to have been received on the night of the 9th of May, A. D., 1863, in consequence of insufficiency of the highway in said town. The plaintiff testified in substance that while driving alone, in a single buggy wagon, in passing a covered sleigh, the wheel struck into a rut or sag, threw out the "King Bolt," thereby disengaging the fore wheels from the body of the carriage, and throwing him to the ground, injuring his right shoulder so as to render it instantly, utterly powerless, and the arm useless. That he then caught his horse, put the wagon together, and drove home, a few miles distant, having no assistance from any one, and not speaking to any person on the subject of the accident, until he reached home. That he had not recovered the use of his shoulder, but had been compelled to carry his arm in a sling, up to the present time. His testimony tended to show that the depression at the deepest place of the rut, was six or eight inches.

The defendant gave in evidence that the deepest depression there, as shown by measures made the next day, was only four and a quarter inches, and the track perfectly smooth, and free of obstructions other than this depression; that several persons, in presence of the plaintiff and his counsel, a few days after, for experiment, drove through the place with similar carriages, and with the same one, without any marked effect except a jar or jolt; that the surveyor had passed over the road shortly before and found no want of repairs other than is usual upon such roads at that season of the year, the ground being only within a few days, free of snow and frost; that plaintiff was seen before reaching the place driving with great velocity, and in like manner about one hundred and fifty rods after passing the place, on the same night; that no trace or mark was to be seen on the road, of any kind, indicating the fall of a wagon there, or other disturbances of the surface; that plaintiff had been seen often to use the arm freely, since the alleged injury, by driving fast horses at full speed, with reins in both hands, "sawing the bits," applying the whip, also helping himself into wagons by placing one hand on the seat, (the lame one) and the other on the dasher; likewise harnessing horses, hitching the logs, using both hands; riding one horse and leading another by a strap held in the lame hand, and using a whip at the same time, and other like exercises.

The plaintiff in reply, testified to the contrary of most of the allegations on the part of the defendant, particularly as to fast driving, and as to the use of his arm to the extent described by the defendant's witnesses; also called surgeons who were of opinion that the shoulder had suffered permanent injury, though unable to determine the precise nature of it; and called several persons who had travelled the road shortly before and after the time of the occurrence, and met with some difficulty there. One had been thrown out of a "trotting gig" on his horse, (the driver resting his feet on the cross-bar at the time, there being no braces or stirrups.) One had broken a looking glass which he was supporting against his knees, while driving "smartly." One sitting on a piece of board resting on the side of a lumber wagon, had his seat jolted off at one end. One had his king bolt nearly drawn, some two or three had it entirely drawn out. Also one witness who saw, next morning after this injury, where a king bolt appeared to have struck in the road, about ten or fifteen feet in advance of the rut. It appeared that no complaint had been made of this piece of road. The defendant claimed that the liability of towns, arising out of the duty to keep roads in repair, is to be measured by the limits of possibility; and that to preserve a highway at that early season of the year in smooth condition is impossible, of which persons using the road should take notice; and claimed that with the use of due care no accident would have happened. The jury were out but a short time, being at the start unanimously for plaintiff. Verdict for plaintiff. \$1868.58. Burke & Hardie, and Bartlett & Redfield for plaintiff. Davis & Colby for defendant.
