The nests are so constructed as to be all taken apart in two minutes; they are perfectly smooth inside and out, and once in every two months I have them taken down, cleaned, and then thoroughly coated with common whale oil, and I have never yet seen a single louse near them, nor can one be found around my premises.

Cost of Keeping a Horse. During the past winter, as well as on previous occasions, I have calculated the cost of keeping horses, both young and old; and my experience has led me to believe that a horse weighing 1,000 pounds, and being worked more or less, several times a week, can be kept on fifteen pounds of hay (five pounds at each meal) with three quarts of corn, or six quarts of oats per day.
