

AT DANVILLE.

Children's Day Concert.

Libbey for a collection to be used to help poor young men to secure an education. A generous response was received by the ushers, Flora Woodward and Mary Green.

Preacher's Meeting.

The preacher's meeting of the St. Johnsbury district was held at the Methodist church Tuesday and Wednesday, June 10 and 11. The meeting opened Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 with a devotional service led by Rev. M. H. Ryan of Peacham. The presiding officer for the afternoon was Rev. J. O. Sutherland, presiding elder. At the business session it was voted to hold three more meetings this year. The places decided upon are Williamstown, Newport Center and Peacham. The rest of the afternoon was spent in discussing the temperance question. These papers were read as follows: "What shall be our attitude towards Local Option?" Rev. A. Gregory, Rev. W. J. McNeil; "Is our Prohibitory Law in danger?" Rev. J. A. Dixon, Rev. E. E. Currier; "Is the Anti-Saloon League helpful to the Prohibitory Law?" Rev. W. C. Newell, Rev. P. N. Granger. The subject was then opened for discussion by the house and was very spirited and interesting, over twenty pastors taking part. In the evening there was a preaching service, the subject "Soul Marriage" was treated in a masterly and intelligent manner by Rev. J. M. Frost of St. Johnsbury. Wednesday morning the devotional service was led by Rev. I. P. Chase of Newport Center. The presiding officer for the forenoon session was Rev. P. N. Granger. The reports by the pastors were full of interest and encouragement to all. Several changes in the district have increased the pastor's salaries for the coming year. Two papers were presented: "Sermons for the summer," Rev. O. E. Aiken, Cabot; "Summer revivals," Rev. G. H. Wright. These were thoroughly discussed by nearly all present. At the afternoon service Rev. Joseph Hamilton of Danville was presiding officer. The principal work was the review and discussion of the book entitled, "The Life Worth Living," by Rev. W. C. Newell of Newport. The review was by Rev. J. E. Knapp. Both the book and the review were carefully and intelligently criticized by all the pastors present. The evening sermon was by Rev. D. C. Thatcher of Newbury on the text "If any man shall do His will he shall know of the doctrine." There were 22 pastors present, four of them bringing their wives. All united in pronouncing it the best meeting held in several years. Many of the townspeople attended all the services and all left refreshed and refreshed in the Christian life.
