Supreme Court's Decision.

The United States supreme court decided Monday that it had no jurisdiction in the case of Mary Rogers, the convicted murderess of Vermont. There seems to be now no hope that she will escape the gallows on Dec. 8, the date set for her execution.
The court affirmed the decision of the United States district court of Vermont. Mrs. Rogers is under sentence of death in Vermont for the murder of her husband. The effect of the decision will be to again place the responsibility of dealing with the case in the hands of the state authorities, and if in the meantime neither the governor nor the state courts take action in Mrs. Rogers' behalf her execution must occur on the day set, Dec. 8.
The opinion concluded with an order that a mandate issue immediately. This will obviate raising the question of the possible postponement of the day of execution.
Attorney General C. C. Pitts advises Sheriff Peck that it is his duty to request the state's attorney and twelve citizens, including a physician, to be present at the execution of Mrs. Rogers, if she hangs, and the citizens shall be residents of Vermont. The sheriff can invite the other eleven from among whom he chooses. He advised it is his duty to admit the clergyman the prisoner desires, counsel and relatives, and in addition he shall have sufficient deputies who shall not be included in the eleven, not counting also the officers of the prison.
