A Danville Tragedy.

Edward Manning Found Dead and Arthur Rogers and Joseph Labree under Arrest—Many Circumstances Point to a Murder.

Rum was the cause of another tragedy when the dead body of Edward Manning was found on Joseph Labree's farm last Thursday morning, and the trial at the December term of the Caledonia Co. court will determine whether or not Labree and Arthur Rogers were implicated in the deed. Both the latter are silent as to the circumstances that led up to the death of Manning, but from what follows it is not difficult to believe that they know more about it than they have yet divulged.

The public first heard of the death of Manning when Joseph Labree reported to the selectmen that he had found on Thursday morning his body in the pasture. Labree lives alone in a house about two miles from Danville Green on the road that leads from the Cole place, the latter being on the main road to West Danville. Manning came around Saturday and sometime the next day Rogers appeared. The latter had recently had a scrap with another party and had a black eye when he arrived at Labree's. They went off for some liquor and Monday night received two quarts of alcohol and a bottle of gin. Throughout the night they proceeded to dispose of this, with the natural result that by Tuesday morning they were well intoxicated. About the time that the liquor arrived two young men appeared to spend the night, Arthur Labree and "Mel" Labree, a son of Joseph Labree. Their testimony at the inquest brought out the fact that early Tuesday morning Rogers and Manning had a scrap and that Labree, senior, had advised Rogers to leave the place as there might be trouble. Rogers claimed that Manning left the place Tuesday afternoon and Labree says he himself went to Walden the same day and did not return until Thursday morning. Both say they never saw Manning alive again.

The body of Manning was found face downwards, the head covered with a hat that was not his own, and by his side a pipeful of dry tobacco and an unlit match. The face was bloody and the man's clothes were dry. The night before it rained quite hard, which would seem to dispose of the story that the body lay outdoors over night. The selectmen took the body to the town hall and sent word to St. Johnsbury that they wanted the officers. Deputy Sheriff Worthen drove at once to Danville taking with him J. Rolf Searles, who represented the state in the absence of the coroner.
