Mrs. C. A. Miltimore was called to St. Johnsbury last week by the illness of her sister, Mrs. Hugh Miltimore.


Mrs. O. B. Cutting was the guest of her sister, Mrs. Lambert Farnham, at St. Johnsbury last week.
