Annual Town Meeting March 2, A. D. 1909.

The inhabitants of the Town of St. Johnsbury, who are legal voters in the annual town meeting in said town, are hereby notified and warned to meet in the Town Hall, at the Village of St. Johnsbury, in said town, on Tuesday, the 2nd day of March, A. D. 1909, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, for the following purposes, to-wit:

ARTICLE 1st. To elect all town officers required by law for the year next ensuing and in the manner heretofore determined.

ARTICLE 2nd. To ascertain whether the town will vote to raise a sum of money, by a tax on the grand list of said town for A. D. 1909, sufficient to pay all State, State School, State Highway and County taxes which are or may be lawfully assessed to said Town of St. Johnsbury and payable the ensuing current year; also to pay the installment of the town funded debt and interest on the entire funded debt, coming due and payable in the year 1909, and January 1st, 1910; also to pay the interest on the United States deposit money now or may be held during the current year by the town as required by law; also to pay any and all special appropriations heretofore voted or may be lawfully made at said meeting; also to pay the principal and interest on any indebtedness of the town not otherwise provided for; also to pay all current expenses of the town, including the support of the poor of the town and the town school expenses, and town road commissioner's expenses not otherwise provided for by law; and any other lawful expenses of said town which may accrue and not otherwise provided for by law, and if any sum, how much?

ARTICLE 3rd. To ascertain whether the town will vote to pay a certain sum of money from the treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray in part or in whole the expenses of an appropriate observance of "Decoration Day," so called, as authorized by law, and if any sum, how much?

ARTICLE 4th. To ascertain if the town will vote: "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?"

ARTICLE 5th. To see if the town will vote to elect a Tree Warden.

ARTICLE 6th. To see what action the town will take in reference to the United States deposit money now held by the town.

ARTICLE 7th. To see if the town vote to raise a sum of money in addition to the amount now required by law to take advantage of the State Aid Law, and if so, how much?

ARTICLE 8th. To see what action the town will take as to compensation for the Treasurer's services.

ARTICLE 9th. To do any other business that may be lawfully done at said meeting.
