Death of James Morrill Aged Citizen of the Town.

James Morrill passed away at his home in Danville, Oct. 25 at 11.45 a. m., at the advanced age of 88 years, four months, and 13 days. His funeral was held at his late home, Thursday, and was held at Danville Green. James Morrill was born in Danville, June 19, 1823, the son of Truman and Melien (Chamberlain) Morrill and the last grandson of Capt. James Chamberlain who was born in Hopkinton, Mass., in 1769. He has always lived on the farm where he was born, caring for his father and mother. At his mother's death his niece, Mrs. A. C. Winn, went there to live tenderly caring for him in his declining years. In 1885 he went to Minneapolis with his brother-in-law driving a good deal of the way. LEGISLATURE IS BUSY (Continued from page 1.) referred to the joint committee on state and court expenses.

S. 19—By Senator Dale of Essex, an act to incorporate the Brighton & Newark railway. (Shall not be compelled to operate the line except from May to December, inclusive, unless they otherwise elect. Capital, \$40,000, shares \$25 each. Can connect with Grand Trunk railway at points mutually agreed upon. If they cannot agree on point of connection the public service commission to decide. May borrow money at interest not in excess of six per cent. Line to run from Brighton to Newark Granite Co. (Newark).)

S. 20—By Senator Cushman of Bennington, an act restricting trustee process. (Any person obtaining judgment in any court in this state against a wage earner may file specified copy with employer or subsequent employer, who shall deduct 10 per cent. weekly wage to apply on judgment until satisfied. If more than one judgment weekly deduction shall be equally divided until judgment is satisfied. Wage earner shall be a person who is earning in excess of \$20 weekly. No assignment of wages subsequent to the passage of this act shall be valid against its provisions.)

A bill introduced by Mr. McHugh of Westbury, may be considered an "administration measure," since it incorporates a recommendation of Governor Mead that owners of dogs must furnish bonds. Mr. McHugh also introduced another bill that owners of animals or fowls wounded or killed by dogs shall receive double the damage sustained.

A hunter's bill was introduced by Mr. Martin of Hartland, providing that bona fide residents owning property listed in the state to the amount of \$1,000 shall pay a license fee of 50 cents, while non-residents shall pay \$15, with clerk's fee of 50 cents.

By Caledonia County Men. A joint resolution was introduced by Senator Porter of Caledonia, providing that the committee visit the state normal school at Castleton and secure an option on its purchase.

Rev. W. J. Hawk of Barret Center offered a joint resolution providing that the income tax amendment to the federal constitution be referred to the committee on federal relations.

S. 39—By Senator Darling of Caledonia, an act to amend section 5433 and 5436, public statutes, relating to public health. Health officers' fees for reporting contagious disease 15 cents each; annual report \$1.00, and for inspection, placarding and quarantining.

By Mr. Bundy of Sutton, a bill relating to the sale of evergreen trees. This is a Christmas bill and provides for a small license and a tax of five cents on each tree sold.

H. 146—By Mr. Coffrin of Groton, a bill relating to the pollution of Wells river.
