RECENT DEATHS

Smith.
John D. Smith, (DeForge) aged 78 years died at the home of his son, John B. Smith of Goss Hollow Sunday night after a years' illness of rheumatism of the heart, although he was only confined to his bed since December. The funeral was held at Notre Dame church this morning at nine o'clock in charge of the pastor, Rev. E. C. Drouhin. Mr. Smith was born in St. Agnes, Que., in 1834, and married first Miss Lucia Root of St. Johnsbury. Nine children were born to them, eight of whom survive and seven reside in Lewiston, Me. They are Mary, Phillum, Isadore, Prosper, Phillip, Josephine, Joseph and Mrs. Wallington Cole of Groveton, N. H. Jennie died when but a small child. In 1889 he married Miss Emma King of St. Johnsbury and six children were born to this union, William, Alfred, Ephraim, Arthur, George and Julia, all of whom reside in St. Johnsbury. The early part of his life was spent in Lewiston and Brunswick, Maine, and Lancaster, N. H., and for the past 23 years he had lived in St. Johnsbury. Mr. Smith had always been a farmer. Besides the 14 children he is survived by his wife, Mrs. Smith, who is 55 years old and two brothers, Frank of Groveton, N. H., and Alex of Lancaster and one sister, Mrs. Amelia Badger of the same place.

Brown.
The remains of Joseph Brown were brought here for interment Friday and the funeral was held at nine o'clock Saturday morning from St. Aloysius church, Rev. T. J. Leonard officiating. Mr. Brown was 53 years old and until his illness, which was of about two years' duration, was an agent for the Singer Sewing Machine Co. at Barre. His wife, who was Miss Dora Regan of St. Johnsbury and whom he married 13 years ago, survives him with three children. He also leaves one brother, Patrick Brown of Barre, and two sisters, Mrs. Margaret Ivers of Baldwinville, Mass., and Mrs. Martin Atley of Barre. Another brother, Michael Brown of Barre, died last week. The bearers at the funeral were John Todd, Thomas Tierney, James Flannagan and John Ryan. Those that were here from out of town to attend the funeral were: Mrs. Joseph Brown and son, Regan and Mrs. Elmore Ford of Hanover, N. H.; Mrs. Margaret Ivers of Baldwinville, Mass.; Mrs. Martin Riley, Patrick Brown, Michael Nelson and James Brown and Patrick McClary of Barre; Timothy Donning of Brattleboro; Thomas Hazel of Lyndonville, and Michael Murphy of Craftsbury. The interment was in Mount Calvary cemetery.

Knapp.
News was received here last week of the death at her home in Boston of Miss Katherine Knapp, a native of this town, but for the past 50 years a resident of Boston. A short illness of pneumonia resulted fatally, her death coming as a great shock to her many friends.

Miss Knapp's girlhood days were spent in her St. Johnsbury home, and it is of special interest to note that she was one of the charter members of the South church in this place. Her life work was teaching and for over 30 years she was one of the faculty in the Girls' High and Normal school in Boston. One of her St. Johnsbury pupils has delightful recollections of her scholarly attainments, her gracious presence, her success in teaching French, and the love which all the young ladies had for her.

Miss Knapp was a highly cultured lady, having traveled extensively abroad, and her superior attainments, coupled with her charming manner, won her a host of friends. She was a frequent visitor to her native town, being constant in her early attachments and abounding in sentiment in regard to people and places.

Bassett.
Mrs. John Bassett, who moved to St. Johnsbury from Cookshire, Que., in the spring, died at her home on Lafayette street Sunday night, Jan. 28, of a cancer. Mrs. Bassett had two operations, but her last sickness confined her to her bed only a week. Mrs. Bassett was born in Cookshire, Que., in 1870 and had lived up until the time she came to St. Johnsbury in that place. She had a loving disposition and made friends wherever she went. She is survived by her husband, and two daughters, Mrs. John Walker and Miss Elizabeth Bassett of St. Johnsbury, also one sister, Mrs. H. M. Clark of Newport, and a half sister, Miss Olivia Ridgeway, and two brothers, Gillis and George Hall of Dudswell Centre, Que. There was prayer at the home Tuesday evening by Rev. A. P. Grant, D. D. The remains will be taken to Cookshire,

Que., today where the funeral will be held from the Episcopal church at eight o'clock. She received many beautiful flowers from her various friends consisting of a wreath and several bunches of carnations, narcissus and calla lilies. Much credit and praise is given to her daughter, Miss Elizabeth, who gave her entire time and attention to her mother during her long illness.

Hammell.
Mrs. Calvin Hammell, aged 70 years, died at the home of her son, Amos Hammell, on Elm street, Wednesday, after a lingering illness of heart failure, although she was confined to her bed only two weeks. Mrs. Hammell had lived most of her life in Greensboro, and moved to St. Johnsbury last spring. Her husband, Calvin Hammell, died seven years ago. Ten children were born to them, six of whom survive their mother, Mrs. Fred Lamere and Amos Hammell of St. Johnsbury, Leon Hammell of Laconia, N. H., Peter Hammell of Tilton, N. H., and Israel Hammell of Franklin Falls, N. H. The funeral was held from Notre Dame church, Friday, Rev. J. A. Dame officiating. The remains were placed in the vault and will be taken to Greensboro in the spring for interment beside her husband.
