Farmers should spray their potatoes with Bordeaux as a precaution against blight. The farther north the later the blight. It not only decreases or is followed by dry the crop but also is followed by rot on the tuber and by a brown discoloration of the flesh extending in from the outside. In storage it is almost always a dry rot but outside in the field it is often soft rot due to other organisms combining their efforts. Thorough spraying extending from now through the growing season will be a great benefit. Bordeaux may be secured in the form of Bowker's Pyrox, for small areas or may be mixed at home for large areas.
