MUNICIPAL COURT Many Offenders Appear Before Judge Porter For Various Charges

During the past week E. Calcaful of Hardwick was arrested for keeping. He waived examination and was bound over to county court with a bail fixed at \$1,000 for which Mr. Travets, Mrs. Rosa Travers and Amelia Cordell are sureties. James Lambert of Danville was arrested for rape and bound over to county court. Being unable to furnish \$500 bail he is in jail. Levi Poronto of Walden plead guilty to breaking quarantine and was fined \$5 and costs of \$5.84. James Magoon of Hardwick has been arrested for cruelty to animals and is out on \$300 bail which was furnished by B. D. George. The cause is continued to April 20. Eugene Arnold of Groton and Wilfred Guyer of St. Johnsbury answered to the charge of breach of the peace. The former plead not guilty and consents to a trial which will be today. His bail was \$100. The latter plead guilty and paid a fine of \$1 and costs of \$5.54. Four were arrested for intoxication, W. F. Beebe of Hardwick, John Castonguay of St. Johnsbury plead guilty and paid the usual fines and costs. Chris Morressey of St. Johnsbury was brought up for the second offense and paid his fine accordingly. Fred Nichols of Hardwick plead not guilty and was bailed for \$30. Later he plead guilty and was fined \$5 and costs of \$14.98. He is put on probation for five years and has signed a pledge for total abstinence during that time.
