MUSEUM NOTES.

Many new flowers have been shown at the Museum during the past week. Three plants new to the flora of St. Johnsbury have been found growing here. They are Bicknell's wild geranium, hoary plantain and King devil; this last being a close ally to orange hawkweed. It has a yellow blossom and is a noxious weed where it once becomes established. This is the second place in the state where it has been found. The list since August 17 is: Hog peanut, August 17; common blue wood aster, great burdock, ground nut, white vervain, dwarf St. John'swort; rough hawkweed, white snakeroot, clammy everlasting, American pennyroyal, fruit of elliptic-leaved St. John'swort, and wavy-leaved aster, Aug. 18; shining club moss, fruit of painted trillium, fruit of wild lily-of-the-valley, blue-stemmed goldenrod, panicled hawkweed, smooth fingergrass, August 20; elegant marginal shield fern, fruit of sumac, fruit of black raspberry, night-flowering catchfly, lion's foot, panicled blue-stemmed goldenrod, New England aster, fruit of naked mitrewort, fruit of gold thread, fruit of northern bog orchis, great ragweed (Danville), rusty woodia, black nightshade, hoary plantain, Bicknell's wild geranium, king devil, galingale (Bar-

net), August 21.

A loggerhead shrike was seen here August 20. This is a rare species north of Connecticut. It is closely related to the northern shrike or butcher bird, but feeds upon grasshoppers, mice, frogs, etc., rather than upon smaller birds as its northern relative is prone to do.

Charles Robarge, 42, of Somerset, pleaded guilty last week in the Brattleboro municipal court to the charge of killing a deer illegally and was fined \$100, with costs of \$13.35. The deer meat, which was seized, was ordered destroyed and costs of this were assessed at \$11.15. Robarge claimed to Police Chief George Wilson that the deer was eating turnips in his garden when he shot the animal, but he failed to report the killing. The authorities claim that deer meat has been plentiful in the lumber camp for some time.
