

COUNTY'S BANNER COW

A Grade Jersey Made 58.6 Butter Fat In January—Eighty Cows Made 40 Pounds or More.

The cow making the most butter fat in the month of January reported by five of seven cow testing associations of the county was a grade Jersey owned by W. B. Martin of Peacham which made 58.6 pounds. The heaviest milk production was by a grade Holstein

cow owned by George Birch of the St. Johnsbury association which gave 1358 pounds of milk. The highest testing cow was a Guernsey owned by Charles Reed of the Blue Mountain association. There were 81 cows in the five associations reporting that made 40 pounds or more butter fat for the month. The Lamolle Valley association has more 40-pound cows than any other. They are:

Local Bankrupts.

A petition in bankruptcy was filed last week with United States Clerk F. S. Platt by Edmund J. King of St. Johnsbury, a restaurant keeper. He has liabilities of \$7032.58 including \$3596 in secured and \$3214.58 in unsecured claims, his creditors being practically all St. Johnsbury concerns and persons. He has assets of \$4261.13 of which \$2300 is real estate covered by a mortgage and of this amount \$600 is claimed exempt. King had in cash on hand \$1.98.

Local Bankrupts.

An involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed in the office of Clerk F. S. Platt of the United States court against Henry C. Goss of Irasburg, dealer in groceries and grain. The petitioners and their accounts against Mr. Goss are as follows: Henry E. Wilson, St. Johnsbury, \$71.80; French & Bean Co., St. Johnsbury, \$174.46; Whipple, French & Co., Orleans, \$193.57; Twombly & Colton, Orleans, \$59.24; J. G. Turnbull Co., Orleans, \$31.50. It is alleged that Mr. Goss committed an act of bankruptcy on Nov. 29, 1915, by giving W. B. Guild of Irasburg a chattel mortgage for \$2800 on his stock in trade. Frank D. Thompson of Barton is attorney for the petitioner.

Local Bankrupts.

A voluntary petition was filed last week by Frank James of St. Johnsbury. His schedule shows liabilities of \$245.87 and assets of \$67.87, with \$60 claimed exempt. Simonds, Searles & Graves are attorneys for the bankrupt.

VERMONT NEWS

A. C. Gibson, a prominent lumber contractor of Sharon, died to death Feb. 24 after receiving a shot wound in his thigh while attempting to load lumber at the J. L. Condon place. The shooting followed an argument between Gibson and Charles Laton as to the ownership of the lumber. Gibson bought the lumber from Condon but it was also claimed by Laton. Besides being shot Gibson was also hurt on the head by some blunt instrument. Gibson was 55 years old and very popular. He leaves a wife and three children.

VERMONT NEWS

At the semi-annual meeting of the Vermont Veterinary Medical association at Burlington last week officers were elected as follows: President, Dr. Guy N. Welsh of Northfield; first vice-president, Dr. John Thomas of Wells River; second vice-president, Dr. John Canty of Morrisville; secretary, and treasurer, Dr. George Stephens of White River Junction. (re-elected.)

It was voted to hold the next meeting of the association at Rutland on July 12 and 13.

James H. Livingston, for nearly 20 years editor of the Bennington Banner and one of the oldest printers in the state, died Feb. 18. He sold the weekly Banner in 1902 and had since been in the job printing business.

W. W. Russell, cashier of the National bank at White River Junction, has resigned his position to accept one in the treasurer's department of the National Life Insurance company.

Nora, oldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Wheeler of Mill Village, Craftsbury, died Feb. 20 from infantile paralysis after two days' illness. The academy and other schools were closed and every precaution taken to prevent the spread of the disease.

By the will of the late James Russell of Rutland the Rutland hospital receives \$1,000 as a permanent fund, the Methodist church \$500 for the maintenance of the building, the Rutland Missionary association \$1,000 as a permanent fund for an old ladies' home, and Evergreen cemetery \$75. After the personal bequests the residue goes to the hospital, the home missionary association and the church.

Mrs. Clay Foss of Hyde Park, aged 40 years, committed suicide Feb. 20 by shooting herself with a 32 calibre rifle while her husband lay asleep nearby. She had been in poor health for six years.

State G. A. R. Encampment. Stannard Post, Grand Army of the Republic and Woman's Relief Corps are making great preparations for entertaining the State encampment in Burlington in April. Not only will the Vermont veterans foregather there at that time, but large delegations are expected from the Woman's Relief Corps, Sons of Veterans and Ladies of the G. A. R. from all parts of the state, in annual convention.

Department Commander George P. Martin who was in Boston last week attending a meeting of Vermont veterans, was given assurance by many who attended the meeting that they were planning to come to Burlington at the encampment meeting.

Commander-in-Chief, N. A. Montford of Cincinnati, Ohio, expects to be present at the encampment.

A reception will be held for the officers and distinguished guests the evening of Monday, April 17, at the Van Ness parlors which hotel will be headquarters for the encampment officers.

Sessions of the G. A. R. will probably be held in City hall. The auxiliaries will meet at different places to be assigned later.

Asel P. Brigham, one of the few surviving witnesses of the assassination of President Lincoln, died at Barre Feb. 21. He was a veteran of the Civil war. On the night of April 14, 1865, Mr. Brigham was playing the second violin in the orchestra which was furnishing music for the presentation of "Our American Cousin" in Ford's theatre at Washington, D. C. On that fateful night Abraham Lincoln was shot by John Wilkes Booth and Mr. Brigham in after years was able to recall vividly his impressions of the tragedy. He was in the orchestra pit when Lincoln's murderer leaped
