LEGAL NOTICE.

Ellen W. Lang v. Frank B. Lang, Lawrence Leach, W. L. McLam & Passumpsic Savings Bank.

In Chancery, Caledonia County.

Whereas, Ellen W. Lang of Newbury, in the county of Orange and state of Vermont, has entered in the Court of Chancery for the county of Caledonia her Bill of Complaint against Fred B. Lang formerly of Lyndonville, in the county of Grafton and state of New Hampshire, now of Cosmo, Alberta, Dominion of Canada, and the Passumpsic Savings Bank, a corporation with principal place of business at St. Johnsbury, in the County of Caledonia, setting forth in substance that on May 6, 1912, defendant Fred B. Lang, entered into a contract with certain persons not certainly known to oratrix, but whom she believes to be Alfred Thompson of Lyndonville, in the province of Alberta, Dominion of Canada, for the purchase of one undivided half interest in lot twenty-seven in Block forty-one according to plan of part of the city of Lyndonville, in the County of Caledonia, Office for Southern Alberta Registration District plan "A" Calgary, said lot of land premises situated in Lyndonville in the Province of Alberta, Dominion of Canada, and said defendant, Lang, made the agreement for the purchase of said tract of land and premises at a certain price of said land, and that, later the legal title to undivided half of said land was taken to oratrix, and she is informed and believes that she is registered in the Land Titles Office for the South Alberta Registration District as owner of one undivided half of said lot.

That said land was purchased by Fred B. Lang, Lawrence Leach and W. L. McLam, the said Leach and McLam each having purchased one-fourth interest therein.

Oratrix is informed and believes that the said Leach and Lang, in the first place took an option upon said land and paid a certain sum of money thereon, and that when said option expired in order to raise money for the balance of the purchase price, the said Leach and Lang, and defendant Lang, arranged with the Passumpsic Savings Bank of Lyndonville, for a loan, and said Lang, having, without the knowledge of the oratrix, used the proceeds of the loan to pay the balance of the purchase price of said land, and that, later the legal title to undivided half of said land was taken to oratrix, and she is informed and believes that she is registered in the Land Titles Office for the South Alberta Registration District as owner of one undivided half of said lot.

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present market price of land in Alberta, said land is not worth enough to pay said note, that oratrix has through her attorney, called upon said Leach and he has always stated and admitted that it belonged to him to pay one-fourth of said note, but has declined to produce any evidence showing any legal liability on his part; that oratrix holds the property as trustee for her brother, Fred B., and is accountable to him as such trustee and said McLam is in Calgary, aforesaid, and has managed or rented said property for some years and has made, or claims to have made, large expenditures in repairs and to have a large account for personal services, that the arrangements that have been made with said McLam have been made by the said Fred B., and that she has received statements from the said McLam calling for payments for expenditures claimed to have been made by him over and above rents which he claims to have received, and oratrix has shown such statements to said Fred B. and he does not admit the correctness thereof and does not authorize payment of same by the oratrix, and oratrix shows that said Fred B. either is or professes to be unable to meet the payments upon said note or the interest thereon and that oratrix has made certain payments of interest; that there are one or more \$500.00 installments due and unpaid, that said McLam has a large account which he is presenting for adjustment and that oratrix is not in a safe position to adjust the same without the consent of the said Fred B.; that oratrix is dependent upon her brother for the payment of said note and that said trust is a great embarrassment, and that she desires to be relieved from her connection with said trust estate.

That said property consists of a lot and buildings thereon, and cannot be divided without great detriment, and she prays that accounts between her and the said Fred B. may be ascertained and stated, and that said Leach be adjudged liable as joint debtor upon said note, and that oratrix may be granted leave to sell said property and to collect and apply the proceeds in payment of said note, and that if the proceeds of the said sale are not sufficient to pay said note that she may have a decree against said McLam, Leach and Fred B. for such sums as, respectively, belongs to each of them to pay and that accounts between her and the said Fred B. be settled and adjusted and oratrix discharged from said trust upon giving a full, true and just account of her trusteeship and the substance of said bill and this order, three weeks successively, in the St. Johnsbury Caledonian, a newspaper published in said county, the last of which publications to be at least twenty days prior to the 23d day of December A. D. 1916, or said bill will be taken as confessed; And it is further ordered, that notice of the pendency of said bill of complaint be given said defendant, by publication of the substance of said bill and this order, three weeks successively, in the St. Johnsbury Caledonian, a newspaper published in said county, the last of which publications to be at least twenty days prior to the 23d day of November A. D. 1916.
