

SUFFRAGE OFFICERS ARE ELECTED; MRS. A. L. BAILEY MADE PRESIDENT

(Special to the Caledonian.) St. Albans, June 28.—The Vermont Equal Suffrage Association which opened its annual equal suffrage convention at St. Luke's Parish House yesterday morning, adjourned this afternoon after the election of officers and the adoption of several important resolutions. It was voted to amend the constitution to provide for a separation of the duties of the corresponding secretary and the state organizer. This in effect creates a new office, that of state organizer. The report of the corresponding secretary shows that there are about 18 local leagues in the State, thirteen new ones having been started during the year. They are: Newport, Middlebury, Johnson, Morrisville, St. Johnsbury, Concord, Woodstock, Fairhaven, Bennington, Brandon, Fairhaven, Randolph and Richford. The reports of the treasurer, Mrs. Lucia Blanchard of Montpelier, showed a total of \$448.12 on hand, and expenses of \$268.10. The following officers were elected: President, Mrs. A. L. Bailey of St. Johnsbury; first vice president, Mrs. W. C. Schofield of Burlington; second vice president, Mrs. W. L. Bryant of Springfield; corresponding secretary, Miss Anna Batchelder of Woodstock; recording secretary, Mrs. H. H. Thompson of Richford; auditor, Mrs. John Spargo of Bennington; state organizer, Mrs. Lillian H. Oldenham of Woodstock; treasurer, Mrs. Lucia Blanchard of Montpelier. The convention went on record as deploring the recent passage of a measure by the Vermont Legislature whereby the present labor laws for women and children would be suspended during the war. The militant activities of the Congressional Union by picketing, banner dropping, etc., was deplored, it being the belief that they have seriously injured the cause of equal suffrage. Loyalty to the National Suffrage Association and its policies were reaffirmed. The convention urged upon presidents of local leagues that they advise their leagues to await definite orders from the Woman's Council of National Defense before undertaking any organized patriotic work other than Red Cross in order to avoid waste of energy and multiplicity of organization. Appreciation was expressed for the service of the press of the State as a whole in granting the freedom of its columns for legitimate suffrage news.

Nickel Plant Will Combine With Britain

Christiansburg, Norway, June 29.—A nickel refining company at Christiansburg which is the principal producer of nickel for the German government's torpedo factories, is about to become a partner of the British government in one of the largest nickel producing enterprises in Canada. The investment will be more than \$10,000,000. The mines from which the new company will get its supply of ore contain about 13,000,000 tons. Production is expected to be at the rate of 10,000 tons of nickel and six thousand tons of copper a year. The re-

fining and extraction will be by the same processes as are now used in the Christiansburg plant, the manager of which is at present in Canada.

The Norwegian capital invested in the new company is about \$2,600,000. The largest shareholder is the British government.

CUBAN DOCTOR WILL FIGHT YELLOW FEVER

Havana, Cuba, July 1.—Dr. Juan Gutierrez, the Cuban director of sanitation, has received authority from the international health board of the Rockefeller foundation to institute a campaign in other countries to stamp out yellow fever. President Menocal has granted him leave of absence to enable him to undertake the work. Dr. Gutierrez expects to be absent from this city about five months. The Cuban sanitary official is regarded not only here but in the United States, as an expert on methods of fighting yellow fever. As a member of the yellow fever commission of the international health board he visited South American cities last year to aid in suppressing the spread of the disease there.

Major General William C. Gorger, chairman of the yellow fever commission, has written Dr. Gutierrez giving to him full authority to investigate yellow fever conditions wherever they may be found in other countries, and to make any suggestions that he may see fit toward the extermination of this disease. Director Taylor of Las Animus hospital here is likewise co-operating with Dr. Gutierrez in this work. For the present it is proposed to start the scientific researches on the island of Martinique and in Maracaibo. The Rockefeller foundation has assigned to Dr. Gutierrez all the scientific apparatus, instruments, serums and toxins necessary for the investigation. Dr. Gutierrez will leave Havana early this week for Maracaibo by way of Porto Rico. An eminent corps of sanitarians, physicians and civil assistants will accompany him.
