Hulda Harrison was born in St. Johnsbury, May 15, 1840, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Harrison. In 1880 she married David E. Harriman of this town. Mr. Harriman died in 1910. Mrs. Harriman is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Martha Dean and Mrs. Joseph St. John; two brothers, Frank of Maine, and Dwight Harrison of Littleton, N. H. She was well known in St. Johnsbury and will be missed by many.

Edward E. Higgins.

At his home in Clinton, Conn., on Wednesday, June 20, occurred the death of Ensign Edward Everett Higgins, after an illness of two weeks, terminating in cerebral meningitis.

He was the son of George W. Higgins, a native of St. Johnsbury, and Caroline Denison Higgins, of Burke, and was born in Chelsea, Mass., in 1864. A graduate of Boston Institute of Technology, he spent the year after his graduation on the electric plant of the Fairbanks Co., of St. Johnsbury. Since then his business interests have been in Buffalo and New York City, and for some years he has been vice president and treasurer of the Moore-Cottrell Subscription Agency of Brookport, N. Y. During the last year, through his suggestion to the General Assembly of Connecticut, he was made ensign under Admiral Usher of the Brooklyn Navy Yard, and commissioned to organize the automobile owners of Southern Connecticut for volunteer coast defense duty, with headquarters in New Haven. To this work he gave his entire time, getting rapid results by his knowledge of efficient business counting in a pride and joy to be of service to his country.

He was a member of the Masonic fraternity, of the Technology and University Clubs of New York, of the Boston City Club, the Society of Colonial Wars, and an honorary member of Delta Theta Xi.

He was a glad, sunny, generous, open-hearted spirit from childhood through life, with the loyalty that never forget a friend and the genuine love for his fellow men that made him ever ready to lend a hand to neighbor, friend or stranger.

He studied the needs and conditions of the times and his outlook was broad and far-reaching.

He is survived by his widow, two sons, Austin D. and Philip W. Higgins, the former a Lieutenant in U. S. Army, now at Fort Royal, S. C., and the latter a member of the United States Signal Service Corps in Boston; also by his mother, Mrs. Caroline W. Higgins, and two sisters, Mrs. Charles H. Higgins and Miss Lucy A. Higgins, of Arlington, Mass. His only brother, William D. Higgins, of Arlington, died in January, 1914.

ST. J. MEN FORM SYNDICATE

Have Secured Tract of Timber Land—Product for Acroplane Manufacture.

George W. Caldwell, Dr. J. M. Allen, V. E. Lurchin, C. R. Lynch, F. C. Mayo, G. E. Woods, C. A. Burrows and E. J. Demers, of St. Johnsbury, are members of a syndicate which is financing a big lumber deal in the Lake Megantic, Lowelltown, Me., region. The land transferred to the syndicate comprises approximately 14,000 acres. The land is heavily timbered with hard and soft wood and the St. Johnsbury corporation will begin logging operations the coming fall.

The spruce, probably 300,000,000 feet, will be cut first. Negotiations for marketing the product have been partially made. The clear stock will be used for the manufacture of aeroplanes and the second cut for pulp.

The tract was formerly the property of Edwin C. Merrill of New York. The new owners will form a stock company.
