The letter stated that the entire 103rd Regt. was in England, "somewhere in England." The boys are all well and had a fine trip over. There are many Vermont boys in this regiment, and Sanborn wishes all parents to hear this news. So much mail is lost, he fears some of the boys' letters will never reach their destination. Lieut. W. Mr. Woodward's entire life has been spent in Danville with the exception of one year, which he spent in Morrisville, where he was a proprietor of a drug store. For the past 20 years he has been a very successful salesman for the Essex Fertilizer Co., of Boston, and in this position he has become widely known and has made many friends throughout the territory where he has labored.
