To any one who has given attention to this subject for a few years past there are two prominent reasons for astonishment .-First, that the tax paying community have so long and so quietly endured the reckless extravagance of those who have controlled the affairs of the State, - and secondly that the rulling dynasty have had the posed, to persevere so tenaciously in their course of corruption. On examining the Auditors Report for 1844 the startling fact of continued is not increased extravagance and corruption stands out in bold relief.

To be fully convinced of this we need examine but few items of that Report .-The amount paid for "State Printing and Stationery"if reported at \$3,335,71, an enormous sum for the little state of Vermont, although a little more than \$1000 less than in 1843. This reduction perhaps may be accounted for as follows, several of the orders in 1343 were drawn for Stationery State Printing &C .- while in the report of 1844, no '&C.' is charged, showing conclusively that the &r. which has been furnished from year to year, cost the State in 1843 something more than \$1000 an entire needless expense, for the state had never any occasion for the least pos sible quantity of that article. But again of the \$3,300 paid for Printing and Stationery in 1844, E. P. Walton & Sons received \$1,943,45 probably in the shape of a bonus, for the falsehoods and deceptions, weekly perpetrated upon its readers, and for re-iterating the stale and senseless croaking of the Auditor of accounts about the \$600,000 fund of the State, with which to liquidate the public

But the rage for extra allowances is not yet abated, for No. 35 in the "abstract," reads thus-JOHN SPAULDING Treas urer for EXTRA SERVICE borrowing and paying \$17,000 of Banks collecting School fund, and paying State Prison debts, &c. allowed by committee of claims \$196,91. An order was drawn to the same Spaulding in 1843 for similar servi ces, of \$584,56 and these are the very services for which the law provides his sala ry, amounting to \$500. Well may the people enquire, why John Spaulding the whig Treasurer of the State, with a salary of \$500, (for the discharge of duties, which cannot possibly occupy the time of a moderately expert business man more than 60 days in the whole,) could have the unblushing impudence, the miserly, grovelling covetousness, to ask for extra pay. Well may they ask why the auditor of accounts, or his committee of claims could be so lost to a sense of the ch'igations they were under to their constituents, as to entertain for a moment such an appeal from that bloated lump of aristocracy. There is a fact connected with the payment of the State Prison debts, which should be exposed to the people in all its naked de-

The superintendant, Mr Swain, urged upon the Treasurer the plan of depositing the necessary funds with him, that those debts might be cancelled at the Prison, and save much trouble to the claimants and expense to the state, offering at the same time to give good and sufficient money. This Mr Spaulding refused, but did finally deposit a portion of the amount with the Bellows Falls Bank, where Mr Swain obtained the money and paid off a portion of those claims without any charge for "extra services," yet this same John Spaulding, the whig Treasurer, charges, and receives pay from the State, for this very service through the benevolence and great kindness of the whig auditor and Whig committee of claims .-Now let it be remembered that all this is the fruits of Whiggery, for none but whigs are entrusted at all with the State finan-
