THE DEATH OF BUSINESS IN THE RETAIL MARKET CONTINUES AND THOUGH THE OFFERINGS ARE OF GOOD QUALITY BUYERS ARE EXTREMELY SCARCE.

POTATOES—Long Island, \$1.50 @ \$1.75; Bristol, \$1.40 @ \$1.60; per bbl; yellow, sweet, \$2.75 @ \$3.25; red and white, \$1.75 @ 2.00 per bbl.

TRUCK—Onions, Egyptian, \$2.75 per bag; Bermuda, \$3 per bag; native, \$2.50 @ 2.75 per bbl; 80 @ 90c per bu. Celery is quoted at 75c per doz; spinach, 10c per box; lettuce, 25c per doz; radishes, 10c per box; cauliflower, \$1.25 per long box. Cabbage are about steady at \$5 per 100 for good lots. Cucumbers are in full supply and easy at about \$1 per box, with some Jersey at 50 @ 75c per crt, with native at \$1.50 @ 2 per box, and with hot-house at 10c per bu. Squashes, \$1.25 @ 1.50 per bbl, as to quality and variety. Yellow turnips, \$1.50 per bbl; white, 75c per bu; carrots, 50c; beets, 30c. Egg plants are steady at \$1.50 @ 2 per crt, as to quality. Leeks are quoted at 10c per doz; mint, 25c; cress, 25c; parsley, 10c per box.

HAY—Per ton, \$18 @ 19; lower grades, \$14 @ 14.75; eye straw, \$16 @ 17; per ton; oat straw, \$10 @ 11 per ton.

POTATOES are a little easier; bulk rose and hebrons, 45 @ 55c per bu; barrels, Long Island, \$1.50 @ 1.60; Bristol, \$1.45 @ 1.50 per bbl; yellow sweet, \$2.50 @ 2.75; red and white, \$2 @ 2.50 per bbl.

BUTTER—Northern creamery, 20 @ 21 1/2c; western creamery, 21c; northern dairy, 20 @ 21c.

CHEESE—10 @ 10 1/2c.

EGGS—Fresh hen, per doz, 24 @ 25; fresh western, 20 @ 21c.

BEANS—Choice hand-picked pea, \$2 @ 2.25; yellow eye, \$2.35 @ 2.40; red kidney, \$2.25 @ 2.45.

PEAS—Choice white, \$1.40 @ 1.50; green, \$1.55 @ 1.60.

FRUIT—California oranges are about over for the season, with only a few left, and prices nominal. There are still a few Mediterranean. They are quoted at \$4 @ 4.75 per box, with half boxes at \$2 @ 2.50. Lemons are in full supply, with the demand fair, though not what it would be with hotter weather. Prices are steady: For 300s the quotation is \$3 @ 4 per box; 300s \$3 @ 3.50c; the latter price for fancy California pears are still at hand; nice and pretty cheap. Native pears are scarce, with few coming forward; California, \$1.25 @ 2.50 per box; native in bins, \$2.50 @ 3.50. Georgia peaches are getting near the end, with Dela ware coming along freely. They are quoted last at \$1 @ 1.75 for Georgia, with Delaware at 50c @ 1.25 per bbl.

Said to Have Three Wives. Boston, Aug. 28.—Governor Crane yesterday honored the requisition in the case of William W. Damon, wanted in Maine for polygamy. Bertha M. Knight of Westbrook, Me., who married Damon in 1901, claims she ascertained that Damon had married Bosie Henshaw in New York City in 1900, which would make the Maine ceremony illegal. It is alleged that officers have found out that Damon married on July 31 last Miss Lettie Wiggin of this city.

Provisional Troops Routed. Cape Elizabeth, Aug. 28.—Major Salvaire, commandant of the Artillery Provisional Troops, has repulsed the army under General Nord of the provisional government and is at present master of the Limbe district.

Crooked Portuguese Officials. Lisbon, Aug. 28.—A great sensation has been caused here by the arrest of several high officials charged with defrauding the state to the extent of \$400,000 and with accepting bribes.

Miraculous Escape from Death. Halifax, Aug. 28.—George L. Jue goes, a seaman on the two-ton schooner F. B. Wade, fell from the topmast to the deck, a distance of 70 feet, and the only injury that he sustained was a broken nose.

Fall River Has \$40,000 Fire. Fall River, Mass., Aug. 28.—Fire in a set of wooden buildings off Pleasant street yesterday caused considerable loss to half a dozen firms, besides threatening destruction to a half score of other nearby buildings. The property loss is placed at \$40,000.

The navy department announces that Captain Chester will succeed Captain Davis as superintendent of the naval observatory. Captain Davis will be placed in command of the battleship Alabama.

Killed Tormenters. Helena, Mont., Aug. 28.—John Rolt, a farmer living near Lewistown, shot George Fredericks and Jacob Stango, neighbors who were endeavoring to handle him in whitecap style. He instantly killed Fredericks and fatally wounded Stango. They had prepared tar and feathers, but he managed to reach his gun before they could act.

Regulation Papers for Foster. Boston, Aug. 27.—Governor Crane has honored the requisition for Julian Foster, a negro, wanted by the authorities of South Carolina, charged with the murder of Lewis White, another negro, and Governor McSwiney of South Carolina has been notified. Foster is now under arrest at Clinton, Mass. He will be taken back to South Carolina.

Lightning's Freaks. At a recent medical meeting in Vienna, says the Vienna correspondent of The Press Messenger, Dr. Jellinek demonstrated a strange case of injury by lightning. The patient was one of the thirteen persons struck by a dash. Not one of the number was killed, yet all were injured. Clothes were torn but not burnt; one man had a foot torn to pieces, yet only a small hole was found in the sole of his foot. The patient had been rendered unconscious for some minutes. Now he is lame in both legs, but Dr. Jellinek hopes to cure him completely.
