INVENTORS TO CELEBRATE. Centennial of the U. S. Patent System to be Observed.

President Harrison has consented to preside at the opening ceremonies of the celebration of the beginning of the second century of the American patent system by inventors and manufacturers at Washington April 8, 1891.

Subsequent meetings will be presided over by the secretary of the inventor, Hon. Frederick Fraley, president of the national board of trade, and Prof. S. P. Langley, secretary of the Smithsonian Institution.

Edison, Bell, Gray, Brush, Thomson, Houston, Westinghouse and other prominent inventors are expected to take part in the celebration.

A special reception will be given to inventors and manufacturers, and the ladies who accompany them, by the secretary of the interior and the commissioner of patents on the evening of April 8, at the patent office, which is being specially prepared for the occasion.

On the 10th of April, which is the anniversary of the signing of the first American patent law by George Washington, an excursion will be made to Mt. Vernon, where an address will be delivered upon "Washington as an Inventor."

DEATH AT THE FEAST.

Secretary Window Suddenly Expires in New York City.

Falling Back Dead Just After He Had Made an Address.

William Window, of Minnesota, Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, died at eleven minutes past ten o'clock a few nights ago in a small room adjoining the banquet hall at Delmonico's, in New York City, where but a few minutes before he had finished delivering the speech of the evening at the annual banquet of the New York Board of Trade and Transportation.

The scene was the most dramatic and tragically sensational ever witnessed at an occasion of festivity in that city.

Secretary Window, after finishing his speech, standing in front of the table of the banquet hall, in the glittering banquet hall, sank slowly into his chair, the seat of honor, being the first to the right of the President of the Board of Trade and Transportation.

Few noticed that he was affected in any unusual way. Applause in hearty rounds greeted his speech as still at its height.

After the Secretary had gained his seat, he sat for perhaps half an hour, looking dazed, and then his head sank slowly forward.

Dr. S. A. Robinson, of West Brighton, Staten Island, who was called by the Secretary at one of the long tables, was the first to notice the change in the Secretary's condition.

Secretary Window's head had meanwhile sunk almost to his breast. His eyes were opening and closing spasmodically.
