Charles A. Berry, a prominent railroad man of St. Louis, Mo., believes that the time is not far distant when railroad colleges will be established, as the railroad business "requires as much technical knowledge and skill as law or medicine."

Secretary of War Elkins has amended regulations so as to confine the enlistment in the United States Army of boys between the ages of sixteen and eighteen years to the grade of musicians or to learn music, and then only to fill a known vacancy.

The opening of the graduate course in philosophy at Yale to students of both sexes is an important step in the higher education of women. It will certainly lead to similar privileges at other universities which have hitherto denied degrees to women, predicts the San Francisco Chronicle.

The poultry products of the United States last year amounted to nearly \$300,000,000; no less than 16,000,000 dozen eggs were imported at a cost of nearly \$2,500,000, while the annual importation for the past four years has been \$2,216,326.

BOSTON LETTER.

Topics and Gossip Dominant the Past Week in the Metropolis.

I have never held in the esteem due to it the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, until quite recently, as I have always regarded such organizations as largely composed of people who were actuated more by a desire for ostentatious display than by motives of a purely humane or philanthropic nature.

The insurance committee of the Massachusetts Legislature has finally agreed upon a bill covering the endowment orders and reported it to the house. The bill embraces an entire new act relating to fraternal beneficiary orders and while most of the provisions of the old act are retained several new features covering endowment orders are introduced. The most important amendment is that providing for a surrender value of 90 per cent if the lapsing member has paid one-tenth of the amount written in the certificate.

The Public Library Bulletin. The new scheme of issuing with the Public Library Bulletin reproductions of old and rare manuscripts is meeting with much favor. The second issue is that of "Tour through the Eastern States in 1792," written by Robert Gilmer of Baltimore—a gentleman whose memory will be held in reverence here from the respect with which he speaks of the "handsome woman" of Boston.
