The University of Vermont and State Agricultural College is a Vermont institution and exists primarily for the purpose of educating the youth of Vermont. The Colleges of Arts and Sciences, of Medicine, of Engineering and of Agriculture are all of the first grade and furnish educational facilities within the state equal to any afforded by the leading colleges of other states. Under provisions made by the General Assembly the work of agricultural extension began last year. A new course in agricultural education designed for the purpose of training teachers of agricultural education for the common schools has also become operative.

Under the provisions of the Jewett fund limited loans of money may be made to students of this state pursuing their studies at the University of Vermont. Certain scholarships are also available for worthy young people.
