

Fire Destroys Large Newport Farm

Fire last Saturday evening destroyed the farm buildings and a large part of the stock of Clover Hill farm at Newport owned by E. C. Blanchard and occupied by Bert Fletcher. The fire started in the hay in the north end of the barn and is thought to be of incendiary origin. It spread rapidly and Mr. Fletcher was able to save very little of his stock. Three horses, one cow, all the pigs, and 150 fowls of blooded stock were burned, beside all of the farm tools and machinery. The barn contained 150 tons of hay and 200 tons of ensilage which was a total loss.

The estimated loss on the buildings and contents, including the dwelling house, will be \$12,600, which was insured for about two-thirds of its actual value.

20,000 Cattle Tested

Livestock Commissioner Fred L. Davis states that during the year just ended, from 16,000 to 20,000 cattle were tested in Vermont and of this number between 7 and 8 per cent were condemned and slaughtered. Commissioner Davis says Vermont has the reputation of having the cleanest dairy herds in the nation with perhaps one exception, which state, however, does not claim to have any cleaner herds than Vermont. Five hundred head of dairy cattle have been shipped out of the state, 200 alone going to Nebraska.

News was received here Saturday, Dec. 5, of the death of Charles Harmon, a former Island Pond boy, at Rouses Point, N. Y. He was 35 years of age.

The funeral services were conducted by the Railroad Trainmen of that place and interment was in Maple Hill cemetery, Rouses Point.
