Fire Destroys Part of East Charleston Town

Echo Inn and E. J. Batchelder's Store in Ashes
Seventeen Buildings Burned to Ground

Yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock fire from an unknown source broke out in the blacksmith shop occupied by Albert Pirard in East Charleston village. In a few minutes the whole building was a blaze. The town has no fire protection of any kind whatever. Help was summoned from Island Pond, Derby and Newport, everyone doing their utmost to save what they could. In less than two hours the flames had spread to more than a dozen buildings, burning them to the ground, with a good share of the household furniture included. The complete store stock of E. J. Batchelder's was burned with the building.

Some of the buildings destroyed are: Echo Inn, E. J. Batchelder's store, W H Grays house and shop, James Hill's house, Had Pipers house and

others. Most of the property destroyed is covered by insurance.

Hard work with little to do with, saved the church from burning, as it was hot that it would go. Saving the church saved the rest of the town as the buildings in that section are close together, including W. G. Stoddard's store. At the time we go to press, (7 o'clock Wednesday night), the fire was under control.
