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VERMONT STATE NEWS

Extensive repairs are being made on the buildings at the Orleans County fair grounds and this season's fair will be on a larger scale than of late years.

A delegation of Springfield, Mass., business men will tour Vermont this month in automobiles. There are agreeable scenic surprises in store for these men.

Newport's hospital fund is coming on well. They have \$30,000 for the building fund and \$28,000 towards the endowment fund. \$29,000 more is needed for the project.

In the municipal court at Newport Harry Beloe of that place was recently condemned to pay a fine of \$105 and costs for intoxication and driving a car while under the influence of liquor.

Vermont schools are to be classified and the work of each placed upon a competitive basis. The new scheme will apply to all practical particulars such as conditions of buildings, equipment and facilities, hygiene, grading and qualifications of teachers.

U. V. M. Sales List of Pure Breeds New Out

The June issue of the Sales List of pure bred cattle, prepared monthly by the Agricultural Extension Service of the University of Vermont, has just been distributed to the County Agents of the state by John A. Hitchcock, Extension Specialist in Dairying. This list comprises a large number of animals of the Ayshire, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey and Shorthorn breeds and provides a wide choice to anyone interested in the purchase of registered stock. Copies may be secured from your county agent or by writing directly to the Extension Service at Burlington.

The present offers an exceptionally opportune time for the purchase of a well bred sire, says Mr. Hitchcock. If the dairymen of the state realized just what the use of a pure bred sire means to them in dollars and cents, no Vermont farmer would be satisfied to use an ordinary scrub or grade animal to head his herd. Even so modest an improvement on the part of the off-spring over their dams as 5 lbs. of milk a day will soon return the purchase price of a good animal. This is not merely theory, but is borne out by the experience of thousands of men who have built up prosperous dairy farms by placing their reliance on the use of first class breeding animals.


