Total weight deer killed-268,114 lbs.
Average weight deer killed-177.8 lbs.
Total number pounds dressed venison valued at 12 1/2 c per pound-178,743- \$22,342.83
Largest buck killed reported from Lamoille County, killed in Stowe by Erton Godfrey, of Stowe, actual weight, 375 lbs.
Number of bucks killed 200 lbs or over, 557.
Number of deer reported illegally or accidentally killed-39; bucks 6.

Letter to the National Tuberculosis Association from President Harding

The White House, Washington, D. C.
November 10, 1921
My dear Mr. Hatfield:

The enormous saving of life reflected by these figures clearly indicates the success of the work of the National Tuberculosis Association and its affiliated organizations.
As Honorary Vice President of the Association, I will be glad to have you convey to all who are interested in the prevention of tuberculosis, my earnest hope that the coming Fourteenth Annual Christmas Seal Sale may be completely successful, in order that your splendid work may be further developed. VERMONT STATE NEWS

A fifteen pound wild-cat or bay lynx was shot in Wallingford recently.
Sixty-three girls are taking the teacher-training course at the University of Vermont.
Orleans has decided to erect a new school building at a cost of \$50,000.
John Hansas of Bartonville a twelve-year-old boy, while in the woods alone, shot and secured a-buck of good size.
Col George Williams, in command at Fort Ethan Allen, is endeavoring to have airplanes permanently established at the fort.
The Texas Oil Co is erecting a large plant at White River Junction, consisting of garage, storehouse, office and pumping station of steel and concrete.
