The Tenth Annual Conference of the Older Boys of Vermont will be held at Barre, Jan. 13-15. It will begin with the supper session Friday evening. Saturday will be filled with addresses, sub conferences, a recreation period, and an evening programme. On Sunday morning the conference speakers will occupy the local pulpits. In the afternoon there will be a conference session, and the closing meeting will be held Sunday evening.

The people of Barre kindly offer free entertainment in their homes to registered delegates, who must be boys between 15 and 21 years of age, or leaders of delegation groups. Delegates are invited from all churches, Sunday schools, young peoples' societies, Y M C A's, colleges, high and preparatory schools, Boy Scouts, clubs, granges, and similar organizations, but they should be boys who earnestly purpose to have their lives count for the best things, and who would be interested in a conference planned to give inspiration and instruction in service for boys by boys.

The speakers will include some of the most successful men in America who are working with boys, among them being Governor Hartness; H W Gibson, State Boy's Work Secretary of Massachusetts and Rhode Island.

Mary Fay Lefebvre

Mary Fay Lefebvre was born at Farmington, Maine, December 11, 1839, and died at her home on Derby Street, Dec. 24th, 1921. She was stricken with a shock on Wednesday evening, Dec. 21st., and never revived, passing away at 8:30 Saturday morning, Dec. 24th.

In 1854 she was united in marriage with Hiram Goodspeed, who enlisted during the Civil War and gave his life for the Union. Four children were born to them, one of whom survives, E. S. Goodspeed, of Boston, Mass.

She married Charles W. Lefebvre in 1865, and their first home was on Railroad Street, removing to Derby Street, where the last fifty years of her life was spent. Mr. Lefebvre died very suddenly in 1886, leaving her with a family of five children, the oldest of whom was eighteen years of age. Her cares and duties were thus doubled, but she was one to whom duty was a pleasure. Her chief delight was the rearing of her family, of whom she was justly proud, and the care of her home. Her love for nature was shown in the beautiful old fashioned garden, which gave pleasure not only to her family and the neighbors, but to all passers-by. The flowers may bloom on, but the gardener will be missed.

It seemed fitting that she should be called at the time when all the world is drawn nearer to the church, especially as she helped so much in raising the funds for the building of the first Catholic Church in Island Pond by soliciting contributions, not only from the

regular attendants, but going into the lumber camps and interesting the men employed there in the need for a church edifice. Her life was full of good works and "When the evening came with its beautiful smile, and her eyes were closing to slumber awhile," she could say with the poet, "I keep some portion of my earlier dream, Brokenly bright, like moonbeams on a river: It lights my life—a far elusive gleam

Moves as I move, and leads me on forever."

She leaves to mourn a wonderful mother and homemaker, five children. Charles J. Lefebvre, Mrs. Sue Fuller, Mrs. Mandy Donnelly, Mrs. Lettie Dale and Mrs. Sadie Russell, nineteen grandchildren, four great grand-children, a brother and sister in Toronto, Ont., and a sister in Pittsfield, Mass. Eight of her grandsons served in the World War.
