MEDICAL MEETING.

The Addison County Medical Society met at the Vermont Hotel, in Middlebury, on Thursday the 17th inst.

The proceedings of the last meeting together with the Constitution and Bye Laws were read.

The President, Dr. Bradford, of Vergennes, read a short but expressive paper concerning his life and death.

The account of the post mortem appearances was then read.

Some discussion here ensued in regard to the distinctive characteristics of typhus fever.

On motion Drs. Russell, Rice and Smith were appointed a committee to draft resolutions.

The Committee having withdrawn, Dr. Harris made some very interesting remarks concerning the chloroform, reporting cases of operations under its influence.

Articles were read and remarks made concerning ether and chloroform inhalation.

Dr. Gale, of Orwell, gave a full and interesting description of the cause, progress, and spread of the fever which has prevailed in that place, extending into Whiting, Cornwall, &c.

Some other remarks were made and resolutions, which were accepted, adopted and ordered to be published.

God, in his providence, has called us to mourn the death of our useful and much esteemed professional brother, JONATHAN ADAMS ALLEN, M. D.

Dr. Allen has resided in this community twenty seven years, and while we are led to deplore his death, we can contemplate him, in his life, with feelings of pleasure.

Resolved, That in the death of Doct. J. A. Allen our medical association has lost a most valuable and efficient member.

Resolved, That we extend to the family and friends of the deceased our warmest sympathies, and mingle with the regrets of his sons our own that he could not have been longer spared to reflect upon the profession and community the light of science, virtue, and religion.

Resolved, That as a memorial of our regard and affection in the death of JONATHAN ADAMS ALLEN, M. D., we will wear the ordinary testimonials of mourning at the meetings of the Addison County Medical Association for one year.

Resolved, That a copy of this preamble and resolutions signed by the President and Secretary, be forwarded to the son of the deceased, J. Adams Allen, M. D., of Michigan.

On motion, by Dr. Warner, S. P. Lathrop, M. D., was appointed by vote of the Society to prepare a biographical sketch. Dr. Lathrop made a few remarks and accepted.

A proposition to amend article 5 of the Constitution was made, and laid on the table till next meeting.

Dr. C. C. P. Clarke was appointed to deliver an address at the next meeting.
