### THE RESULT.

Since the campaign of 1844 has opened, elections have been held in ten States, which have been well contested; and as far as they go, we are willing to take them as the test of public sentiment. There have also been partial elections in Pennsylvania, Virginia, and other States, to fill vacancies in Congress, that show a still more decided Whig gain than the general elections in the States. They all indicate unerringly the complete triumph of the Whig party when Mr. Clay takes the field. We have not a shadow of doubt that his majority will be as large, if not larger, than Gen. Harrison's. We give this, not as idle boasting, but as our opponents to show any change of public opinion, as indicated by the elections, that have taken place within a twelve month, that can invalidate this result. The only States that voted for Harrison in regard to which any doubt can be felt as to their voting for Mr. Clay, are Maine, Michigan and Mississippi, that give 20 votes; to offset which there is much reason to expect that Virginia and Arkansas, giving 22 votes, may vote for Clay. But let us look at the States in detail:

#### MARYLAND.

This State opened the campaign in February, with an election of members of Congress. She made a clear sweep of it, electing 6 Whigs, their having been 2 Locos in the previous delegation. A large majority of the legislature, chosen in October last, is also Whig. The next State that wheeled into the line, was

#### CONNECTICUT.

Election in April, for Governor and Legislature.—Baldwin (W.) had a plurality of 1537 for Governor over Cleveland (L.F.). In the Legislature the parties stood thus:

Showing the unprecedented Whig gain of 80 in the Legislature, in one year. In this statement, some half dozen vacancies in the lower House each year are omitted, as they do not affect the general result, having mostly voted not to send, after two or three trials. The next election was in

#### VIRGINIA.

In the latter part of April, an election took place in this State, for members of the House of Delegates, and to fill two vacancies in Congress (both Locos.) The result was as follows:

Showing a net gain of thirty-two and a majority of 6 on joint ballot, a matter of great importance, as this Legislature has the choice of an U. S. States Senator, on which account the election was warmly contested. The Whigs also gained one member of Congress in Gilmer's District.

#### RHODE ISLAND.

In this State the Locofoco party is deficient, owing to Dorr's ridiculous movement. At the election in May, they could not muster courage enough to start a candidate in opposition to Fenner, (W.) who was chosen by a vote of five thousand five hundred and sixty to two hundred and eighty-seven. The Legislature stands sixty-seven Whigs to twenty-six Locos. The Whig vote for Fenner was two hundred and eighty-two above that cast for General HARRISON in eighteen hundred and forty.

#### LOUISIANA.

Last year the highest majority the Whigs could give on joint ballot in the Legislature, was 3, when the State Printer was chosen. Mr. Johnson (W.) was chosen to the U. S. Senate by a vote of 30 to 38. At the election last month, the result gave 8 Whigs to 9 Locos in the Senate, and 34 Whigs to 26 Locos in the House, so that the Whigs have a majority of 7 on joint ballot. They also gained one member of Congress.

#### NORTH CAROLINA.

The following gives the result of the Legislature, just elected, as compared with 1843:

Showing a Whig majority on joint ballot of 32, and a Whig gain of 56. The Whigs have also the Governor by a majority of nearly 4000, which is a slight falling off from 1842, owing to personal considerations.

#### KENTUCKY.

This State has just chosen a Whig Governor by a majority of over 4500, and 1 reut. Governor by 12,000. To the Senate have been elected 20 Whigs and 3 Locos, and to the House 63 Whigs and 26 Locos leaving 11 more to be heard from. This gives the Whigs the largest majority they ever had in the Legislature, not excepting the year 1840.

#### INDIANA.

Here, also, the Whigs have made important gains, securing to them a U. S. Senator. The Legislature stands as follows:

The popular vote in 42 counties (though this is not a fair test, when no Governor is voted for)—shows a Whig gain of 065, over that given for Governor last year. This State is as safe for Mr. Clay as any in the Union.

#### MISSOURI.

vote is very large, as admitted by all parties. From Alabama, Illinois, and New Hampshire, we have nothing to hope, and we have nothing to lose. We give them up frankly, and agree that Mr. Polk will carry them. The next three States that will go for Polk and Texas, it is not easy to name. In justice to Tennessee, we ought to say, the campaign of eighteen hundred and forty-four was really opened by her last August, when the thunder tones of her victory aroused the Whigs from their apathy, all throughout the Union. A succession of defeats brought on by the distraction caused by the Vetoes, had induced the Whigs to let the elections go by default in all quarters. The Whigs of Tennessee changed this policy, and thoroughly aroused the party; and from that hour it has been marching steadily from victory to victory. Who can doubt the result? The two last Legislature in Tennessee stood as follows: she chooses every two years.

#### VERMONT ELECTION—VICTORY COMPLETE.

Vermont has again done her duty up to the full extent of our largest expectations. Never has Loco-Focoism put more strenuously in requisition every appliance which zeal, energy, art and intrigue could supply, and fought with more desperate resolution than in the struggle which has just been closed. The same may be said of Third-Partyism which has fought with an unscrupulous fury, and spent its last effort in this hard fought battle. But all has been in vain.—The star that never sets is still in a glorious ascendancy. Most nobly have the people of Vermont again vindicated their claims to that rigid and lofty patriotism which goes for the right, the whole country, and nothing but the country. They could not be blink to the great issues which were submitted to their decision. They clearly discerned the truth amidst the mists and deceptions with which their opponents attempted to smother it. In every department of the government Loco-Focoism is completely waterlogged.

We have returns enough before us to show that the Governor is ours. The Senate is ours and the House of Representatives by overwhelming majorities in both bodies.—Three Congress-men out of four likewise grace the splendid victory. Last year Matthews lacked about 13 hundred of an election by the people. Mr. Elide will now be elected by a handsome majority. In the only Loco Congressional District in the State there is no election. Paul Dillingham has been defeated for Congress, and by such a Whig force as to render his future election contingent except by an union of Third-Partyism upon him. Addison County notwithstanding the onslaught of the furious apostles of Third-Partyism upon her just before election, has nobly sustained herself. She has made three Whig gains in the Legislature to the Locos or Third-Party one, and increased from last year between four and five hundred on the State Ticket. The Birney men have very little to boast of in 'Old Addition,' and here and elsewhere have proselyted more from the Loco-Foco party who have attended their meetings and cheered them forward, than from the Whig ranks. The Liberty Party through the State in the same way have gained upon the State tickets a dozen members of the Legislature, and prevented many elections chiefly in Loco towns. But their high anticipations have been blasted, for the present, if not forever hereafter. Last year the party polled 38 hundred and their increase will be about 1500. The Freeman says most of this increase is from the "sham Democracy."

Windham County has done nobly having gained over 1000 to the Whig majority since last year, notwithstanding the addition of 157 to the Liberty party. A few of her townships deserve notice. Cavendish has gained 73, Hartford 109, Norwich 61, Rochester 43, Springfield 148, Weathersfield 66, Windsor, 124, Chester which has been Loco since 1840 and last year a majority of 147 against Matthews has this year given 8 majority for Slade, a gain of 155.

On the Governor vote 41 towns have not been received into are in Franklin, Orleans and Grand Isle Counties, 8 towns in Essex, 1 in Washington, 1 in Addison, 5 in Rutland,

and 3 in Windham. The vote in these towns last year was for Matthews 2908, Kellogg 2572, Williams 390. Should there be a proportionate gain in these towns as in those returned, Mr. Slade's majority will be about 1700, and nearly 7000 over Kellogg. On Representatives, 14 towns not heard from, which sent last year 3 Whigs and 10 Locos and 1 no choice, and not much prospect of changing their representation. The House will be about 130 Whigs and 76 Locos and Abolitionists, of which the Abolitionists claim 10 or 12 of them. The Senate is 10 Whig majority certain, and may be 14. A report is in circulation that Grand Isle County Senator is Loco, by 1 majority, this does not look very probable as the Whigs have carried 4 of the 5 towns for Representative. We may gain Essex Senator as we have gained 51 in 3 towns, and the Loco majority in the County last year was only 91 on Governor.

There is no doubt that Messrs. Marsh, Foot and Colman are elected to Congress by triumphant majorities.

Dillingham is floored, and we trust the black flag of Polk, Texas and Slavery is levelled in Vermont never to rise again.
