## Latest from Washington.

WASHINGTON, May 1.

The vote of the Senate on concurring with the House in the Kansas conference report was yeas 31, nays 22.

On motion of Mr. Hunter, the Senate receded from its amendment to the deficiency bill—25 against 21.

The Cabinet was in session when the Kansas bill was passed. News thereof was immediately carried to them and salutes were fired near the Capitol, in the vicinity of the White House, and elsewhere.

Numerous members of Congress have paired off with the intention of returning to their homes forthwith.

St. Louis, April 30.

The Leavenworth correspondent of the Republican says Peace Commissioners McCullough and Powell left for Utah on the 25th, with an escort of six men.

The movement to occupy the Platte District awaits the arrival of Gen Smith, now at Fort, ready for service, with 1,500 cavalry horses, 200 artillery horses, 2,500 mules. Russell, Majors, and Waddell dispatched in all 300 wagons, 550 being got in readiness.

CINCINNATI, April 29.

The Court Martial met this morning at 11 o'clock, Gen. Jessup presiding. Gen. Twigg objected to Col. Favantleroy sitting in the court on account of former difficulties. The latter said these differences had been long since discarded, but asked permission to withdraw, which was granted. The balance of the day was occupied in examining testimony. Adjourned till 9 o'clock tomorrow morning, when they will probably conclude their labors.
