County Assessor Kean has Received the Following:

Mr. H. M. Kean, Assessor of Dubois County, Jasper, Indiana. Dear Sir:—We have yours of the 26th with average reports of the assessed valuations of the various classes of personal property.

Is this report for the full assessment or has the 25 per cent been deducted? If this is a full assessment your report will be below the average on horses, cattle hogs and sheep. We realize that your County is not one of the best but we do not believe there will be much difference in the valuations of this class of property throughout the State. "No" will be the answer to this question given by every person of intelligence, especially the lawyers. The common man who walks the streets and the uncommon man who runs a big corporation know, equally well, that litigation in the court depends upon the purse.

Money, money, money, and delay, delay, delay! After seven years of expenditure, anxiety, embarrassment and public exposure. Gompers gets what is called justice but it is a mere skeleton of justice, with no redress to him for what he has suffered.
