

The Sub-Treasury.

The federal papers appear to be in deep trouble, for fear the sub-treasury law, passed during the last session of Congress, is so imperfect that it cannot be carried into execution.

But public papers and orators contend that public officers are dishonest and that they will be defaulters. Our answer to this objection is an easy one. The government money, under the old system, is first collected by public officers—then lodged in a bank, and then drawn by a public officer and paid out.

Under the law, it is felony, punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary, for a public officer to use the money of the government to speculate upon, or for any other purpose than that of paying it out to the creditors of the government.
