

**THE COLOR OF HORSES.**—The following article which we cut from the Prairie Farmer, contains statements which, as "facts" or "fancies," if they be correct, horse lavaters may at once come into view, and color will be as important to horses as other artists whose profession is to paint. "There is this—that the color of a horse is a sure indication of his character. In this article I shall attempt to give a few rules, by which a man of common observation can tell the disposition of a horse as soon as he sees him. The first thing to be observed is the color of the animal; the second the phenological developments.—If his color is a light sorrel, his feet, legs and face white, these are marks of kindness. Then if he is broad and full between the eyes, I will warrant him to be a horse of good sense, and easily trained to anything. Such horses should have good treatment; the kinder you treat them the better they will treat you in return. A horse of the above description will never stand the whip if he is well fed. One thing to be always observed in buying a horse, if you want a gentle one, is to get one with more or less white about him.—A spotted one is preferable." We see many of this kind used in circuses. Some have supposed that this color was sought for by the owners of these establishments because of its oddity; it is not so; it is because horses of this description are the easiest trained to perform the difficult feats we see them go through at such places. Again, if you want a safe horse, avoid one that is dished faced; but he may have too much of the go ahead in him to be safe for every body. If you want a perfect spot, by a horse of great bottom; get a deep bay, with not a white hair about him if his face is dished, so much the worse; boys or men, who have not good use of themselves, should never have any thing to do with horses of this kind; they are always tricky and unsafe. I have been deprived of the use of my limbs for 27 years; in this time I have travelled over a large portion of the western country by land in a buggy. In using the horses I have above described, I have invariably found them kind and gentle to manage.—But in using the deep bays I have suffered enough by their treachery to kill 40 men.

**Good Advice.**—Somebody lays down the following rules to govern young men in business. They will apply equally well to young men and old. Let the business of every one alone, and attend to your own. Don't buy what you don't want; use every hour to advantage, and study even to make leisure hours useful; think twice before you spend a shilling, remember you will have another to make for it; find recreation in looking after your business, and so your business will not be neglected in looking after recreation; buy fair, sell fair, take care of the profits, look over your books regularly, and if you find an error, trace it out; should a stroke of misfortune come upon you in trade, retrench—work harder, but never fly the track; confront difficulties with unflinching perseverance, and they will disappear at last; though you should even fall in the struggle, you will be honored; but shrink from the task, and you will be despised.

**The Environs of Jerusalem.**  
The general aspect of the environs of Jerusalem may be described in a few words. Mountains without shade, and valleys without water, the earth without verdure, rocks without grandeur. Here and there a few blocks of gray stone start up out of the dry and fissured earth, between which, beneath the shade of an old fig tree, a gazelle or a hyena are occasionally seen to emerge from the fissures of the rock. A few plants or vines creep over the surface of that gray and parched soil; in the distance is occasionally seen a grove of olive trees, casting a shade over the arid side of the mountain, the mouldering walls and towers of the city appearing from afar on the summit of Mount Sion. The sky is ever pure, bright and cloudless; never does even the slightest film of mist obscure the purple tint of evening and morning. On the side of Arabia a wide gulf opens amidst the black ridges, and presents a vista of the shining surface of the Dead Sea, and the violet summits of the mountains of Moab. Rarely is a breath of air heard to murmur in the fissures of the aged olives; not a bird sings, nor an insect chirps in the waterless furrows. Silence reigns universally in the city, in the roads, in the fields.

Such was Jerusalem during all the time that we spent within its walls. Not a sound ever met our ears but the sighing of the horses, who grew impatient under the burning rays of the sun, or who furrowed the earth with their feet as they stood picketed round our camp, mingled occasionally with the crying of the hour from minarets; or the mournful eulogies of the Turks, as they accompanied the dead to their cemeteries. Jerusalem, to which the world hastens to visit a sepulcher is itself a vast tomb of a people; but it is a tomb without cyresses, without inscriptions, without monuments, of which they have broken the grave stones, and the ashes of which appear to cover the earth which surrounds it with mourning, silence, and sterility. We cast our eyes back frequently from the top of every hill which we passed in this mournful and desolate region, and at length we saw, for the last time, the crown of olives which surmounts the Mount of the same name, and which long rises above the horizon, after you have lost sight of the town itself. At length it also sunk beneath the rocky screen, and disappeared like the chaplets of flowers which we throw on a sepulchre.—*Lamarck's Travels.*

**PUMPING THE WATER OF LAKE MICHIGAN.**—It is well known to our readers that by an arrangement with the bondholders, the state of Illinois has given over to them the unfinished canal, from the waters of Lake Michigan at Chicago to the Illinois river. They are about completing it, but the principal difficulty now is to supply it with water, owing to the level of the lake being eight feet below the bottom of the canal. To overcome this, the present company, after various propositions, finally bethought themselves of raising the water of the lake so as to supply the canal. They wrote to Messrs. Knapp & Totton of this city and furnished them with data to calculate whether it could be done, and what force and what machinery would accomplish it. These gentlemen soon furnished an answer, and the other day received in return an order to build some powerful machinery for that purpose—a steam engine and eight pumps of four and a half bore and six feet stroke. We are glad to hear that this eminently scientific firm have been selected to execute this order. Their shop and mechanical force are not excelled by any establishment in the United States.—*Pitts. **CURIOUS FACT—LAKE SUPERIOR.**—This immense inland ocean, some four hundred and seventy-five miles in length, and about 1,500 of coast, has upwards of thirty rivers constantly emptying their waters into it. But it is well ascertained that the quantity of water discharged by the Sault Ste. Marie is not one-fifth of what the Lake receives from the neighboring mountains and tributary streams. Evaporation must, therefore, be the principal agent in keeping the Lake down to its usual level.—*Lake Superior News.*
