Citizens' Meeting To-Night. The adjourned meeting of citizens held for the purpose of deliberating upon School House matters, will re-assemble at the City Hall this evening. The importance of the subject in hand should bring out a general attendance of citizens.

School House Matters.—Citizens' Meeting. At the meeting of last Thursday evening, J. S. Bricker, Esq., from the City Board of Health, read a report relating to the condition of the School Houses of the city, which had been made to the Board by Mr. Tinsley, the architect employed to make examination of those buildings. The architect's report expressed the opinion that both buildings are insecure in their present condition, but stated that he would, if desired, submit a plan, by which the South Building could, at comparatively small expense, be made secure for some years to come. The North Building, however, was virtually declared beyond all hope of being satisfactorily repaired so as to place it in a condition of security.

Mr. Brasse further reported that the Board of Health had attempted to hold a meeting to take some action on the matter, but had not succeeded, owing to the unavoidable absence of some of the members.

After some discussion, it was finally determined to adjourn the meeting until Thursday evening the 9th inst. in order that the Board might have further opportunity for action upon the subject.

The result of the deliberations of the Board, it is understood, will be communicated to the Citizens' Meeting to be held at the City Hall to-night.

Making Clover Hay. This business being now in order, it may be of use to some to give what W. P. Wolf says on the subject, in the Wilmington Journal. This is his method:

In the first place, "make hay while the sun shines." Cut your clover in the fore part of the day. Spread so that it may get well dried by evening, then cook it and open it out on the ground. In the evening cook again, and open out again next morning. In the afternoon pile it in the mow. Clover hay, cured in the way, is in summer, from about 100 to 150 lbs. per acre, and is excellent for horses and cattle. If others have a better way, I would like to hear from them.
