Congressional Convention—Official Call.

A Democratic Congressional convention for the 4th district is hereby called to convene in the court house at Poplar Bluff, Butler county, on Wednesday, August 25th, 1880, at 10 o'clock, A. M., for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Representative in Congress for the 4th Congressional district, and electing a Congressional Central Committee to serve for two years succeeding said convention, or until their successors are elected. The basis of representation shall be one vote for each one hundred votes cast for Samuel J. Tilden in 1876, or fraction thereof over fifty. By order of the Committee.

The Republicans are howling for "a decent campaign." Then why did not they put up a decent ticket?

To-day the State Convention assembles at Jefferson City. Crittenden appears to have the inside track for Governor.

Hancock's name is good; his record is clear; and as President he will bring the country back to its old-time era of good-feeling, and honest administration.

It is now stated that Hon. Carl Schurz will make speeches in behalf of Garfield and Arthur. We are not surprised at this. He is the champion dirt-eater of America—is the Hon. Carl.

Next week we shall put at the head of this column, the State Ticket, and the week following, the full State and County Tickets. The business of the campaign will then begin in earnest. Hurrah for Hancock and English, and every Democratic name that follows!

Washington county has instructed her delegates to the Congressional Convention to vote for Hon. M. L. Clardy, Madison, St. Francois and Ste. Genevieve have done likewise, while Jefferson takes him as her second choice. Mr. Clardy will no doubt receive the nomination, which is equivalent to an election.

The New York World suggests a design for a Republican campaign badge: "A De Golyer pavement block, argent, proper, surmounted by a morocco pocket-book, gules, rampant, with the inscription 'J. A. G.—\$329,' or that would be a very good emblem under which to march to victory or death, especially death."

By-the-way, what's become of that Mrs. Surratt business? Our Republican friends have let up on it rather prematurely, haven't they? It's a good electioneering story, and properly dished up would serve in place of something better. This campaign is notable for the manner in which the enemy takes hold and then lets go without detriment to us.

Dr. Tanner is still fasting. He "turned the corner" of his forty days last Monday, apparently in excellent condition. When he began his fast he weighed 154 pounds, and he now tips the beam at 135. He eats nothing whatever, but drinks all he wants. His living thus far sets at defiance all theories, and should he survive the forty days' abstinence from food, his case will go upon record as the nineteenth century wonder of the scientific world.

The conventions at Poplar Bluff on the 25th prox., will be but tame affairs. Hon. L. H. Davis will be formally nominated by acclamation by the Congressional delegates, while the Senatorial delegates will do a similar office for Hon. Thos. Mabrey. The serenity of the occasion will be disturbed by no opposing elements, and the caterers at

the Bluff will not have the Bonanza which a different state of affairs would have presented them.

Gen. F. M. Cockrell is a good man and a pure man, and a fair Senator—all these propositions will be accepted without debate. But there are plenty of other good and pure men in the State who would at least make equally good Senators if given the opportunity, and we don't believe in all our representatives in the Upper House of Congress coming from one section. South Missouri has at least as good a right to be represented by one of her own people as North Missouri has to furnish Senator for the whole State.

Some of our Republican contemporaries assert that Hancock is "only a soldier," and no statesman as a President ought to be. He was enough statesman when he issued his famous "Order No. 40" to throw consternation into the Radical camp, and to enlist the persecution of Garfield, who tried to legislate him out of his position as Major General. That General Order asserted that the civil power was above the military, and so long as we have a soldier-President who holds to that doctrine, our liberties will not be endangered.

Gen. Walker, of the Census Bureau, is made responsible for the statement that the South has not gained in population, except in Texas. This is not true of Louisiana, at least, says the New Orleans Democrat. Scattering returns from all sections of the State, excluding New Orleans, show an increase of about 27 per cent. Partial reports from other Southern States make almost as flattering an exhibit. No Western or Eastern State will show as large an increase outside the great cities, if we except the new States in the Far West. The agricultural districts in all the older Northern States show only a small percentage of gain on the population of 1870.

The statement is being industriously circulated by the Republican papers that the Presidential electors of Louisiana are to be appointed by the Legislature by direct mandate of the Constitution. This so-called fact is used to justify any attempt that may be made to disfranchise the people of New York or any other Democratic State with a Republican majority in the Legislature. As long as the statement was confined to the standard organs it was not necessary to correct it, but when a paper like the Chicago Times, claiming to be independent and that should be better informed, gives wide publicity to it, the facts are given. There is no such mandate in the Constitution of Louisiana. The same provision exists upon the subject as is found in the Constitutions of nearly all the States—that the Legislature shall provide for the appointment of electors. The Legislature provided for these appointments in the same manner as the Legislatures of other States—by vote of the people. Both parties have full tickets in the field to be voted for in November, and no other plan of choosing electors is thought of. So much for the latest roorback.—New Orleans Democrat.

About Members of Congress.

In the Eleventh Congressional District of this State quite a spirited contest is going on for the nomination. While General John B. Clark attended to his duties at Washington, his rivals made a thorough personal canvass of the district and thus obtained a certain advantage.

The gentleman who is most prominent in this fight and who desires to displace General Clark is Col. Switzer, of Boone.

It seems rather strange that the people of this district should even hesitate about returning Gen. Clark. If a reelection ever was deserved by hard, faithful work, it is in this case. If a most useful record ever entitled a member to credit that of Gen. Clark does. He is too old to learn? It would take him at least two or three terms to become familiar with the ways and methods of Congressional life. Gen. Clark is a man of great intelligence, energy, experience and integrity. He has provided himself with a most efficient representative. He is known by the old members, popular, pushing, influential. Why, then, make a change?

It is good policy to let well enough alone.

When you have a tried and true servant why dismiss him for one who is entirely inexperienced?

The East acts differently. One of the reasons why the East has such power upon legislation is that there an able member of Congress is returned by his district as long as he is useful. But in the West as soon as a member has attained experience and power he is displaced by a new man who is useless.

If the people of the Eleventh District have any regard for what is right and for their own interest they will return John B. Clark and not try to train a new man, simply because he comes from a different county or part of the district.—St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

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University of the State of Missouri.

COLUMBIA, Boone County, Mo., July 8, 1880.

TO THE CLERK OF THE IRON COUNTY COURT: Sir—It is my duty to inform you that, under the provisions of an Act of the general assembly, approved April 1, 1873, [vide Session Acts, 1873, pp. 183-85, and Rev. Stat. 1875, Sec. 2467, 2468,] your county is entitled to send to the departments of the State University at Columbia and Rolla, during the year ending July 1, 1881, three students, between the ages of sixteen and twenty-five years.

Under the rules adopted by the Board of Curators, students "shall possess a good moral character, and shall pass a satisfactory examination in orthography, reading, writing, arithmetic and geography;" and must pay the fees prescribed by said Act, to-wit: On matriculating, an entrance fee of ten dollars, and containing fee of five dollars; and a like containing fee at the beginning of the second half year, making the whole annual charge twenty dollars; WHICH MUST BE PAID BY EVERY STUDENT, except regularly ordained ministers of the gospel belonging to any of the various religious denominations in this State, and indigent young men preparing for the ministry. For the schools of Law and Medicine and Engineering, the annual charge is forty dollars, each. The session of all the departments under the presidency of Samuel S. Laws, LL.D., will begin

ON THE SECOND MONDAY (13th) OF SEPTEMBER, and will continue until the first Thursday of June 1881—except that of the School of Mines and Metallurgy at Rolla, which will begin and end one week later.

Ample provision has been made for the education and care of young women in all the classes of the University, and a course of study specially adapted for them has been adopted. See catalogue 1879-80, pages 53 to 60, 123 and 127. A girl's home for about twenty boarders has been provided adjoining the campus, under the care of the lady principal, Mrs. Carr.

I beg to call your attention to the appended extract from the law on the subject.

You will please advise, in writing, the number of pupils that such county is entitled to send to the State University the next scholastic year, which certificate shall be filed with the county clerk for two weeks, in a newspaper published in such county. The expenses thereon shall be paid by the county, and paid out of the County Treasury.

Persons desiring to enter the State University at Columbia or Rolla, are required to matriculate in person, and to do so on or before September 1, 1880.
