Proceedings of the Republican Mass Convention.

IRONTON, Mo., Sept. 11, 1880.

The Republicans of Iron county, Mo., met in mass convention at the courthouse this afternoon, pursuant to a call of the Chairman of the Republican County Committee.

Convention was called to order by the W. W. Haywood, Chairman of the Republican Committee, who made a few remarks as to the object of the Convention.

Dr. E. May was then called to preside as Chairman of the Convention and J. W. Wilkinson as Secretary.

On motion, Dr. E. May was elected delegate to the State Convention, which meets in St. Louis, Mo., on the 15th inst.

The following County Ticket was then nominated, viz.: W. W. Haywood, Esq., for Representative; Samuel T. Gay, Esq., for Sheriff and Collector; J. N. Semands, Esq., for County Judge Western District; A. H. Eaton, Esq., for Assessor; Dr. T. R. Goulding for Coroner.

On motion, Charles Von Roden, Esq., of Pilot Knob, and J. W. Lashley, Esq., of Belleview, were added to the County Committee.

On motion, the County Committee was instructed to confer with committees of other counties in the District as to the advisability of nominating a candidate for Congress and for the State Senate.

The following preambles and resolutions were read by Dr. T. R. Goulding and unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, It is a notorious and well-established fact that a large sum of money, approximately \$300,000, paid into the State Treasury by the overburdened tax-payers of this State, was placed in the hands of a ring composed of personal and partisan friends of the State Treasurer and other officials, and by them squandered; and

WHEREAS, This large sum has been unavailable to the State and has entailed a loss of interest on the same for about three years past; and

WHEREAS, At the last session of our State Legislature an effort was made to compel the State Treasurer to settle with the State and account for the money squandered; and

WHEREAS, The ring composed of his personal and partisan friends, and also to institute suit for the recovery of the sum so squandered from the Treasurer's non-payment; and

WHEREAS, In all these efforts to protect the interests of the tax-payers of the State, the Representative from this county (and who is now the Democratic candidate for re-election) persistently worked and worked to protect the ring, and opposed every measure to investigate the charges or to proceed against the Treasurer and his bondsmen and compel them to refund the money taken from the tax-payers; therefore,

Resolved, That we appeal to the voters of Iron county to consult their own and the public interests by refusing to re-elect as Representative a man who so notoriously made himself the willing and subservient tool and defender of the State Treasury ring, which has so shamefully robbed the people of the State.

Resolved, That the candidate who this day nominate for Representative is hereby instructed, should he be elected, to make every honorable effort in his power to compel the plunderers of the State Treasury to refund the money which the squandered upon favorites.

Short speeches were then made by W. W. Haywood, Esq., and Dr. E. May, after which Hon. Newton Crain, of St. Louis, was introduced, who made a most telling speech, which was frequently applauded.

Convention adjourned at 5 o'clock P. M., to meet again at 7:30 o'clock P. M.

Meeting called to order at 8 o'clock P. M. by Dr. E. May, Chairman, when Mr. Crain again addressed the Convention in his usual happy and argumentative style, which received loud and repeated applause from the unusual large and appreciative audience of ladies and gentlemen.

On motion, the thanks of the Convention were extended to the speaker; also, to the Ironton Cornet Band and the young gentlemen composing the Singing Club for the excellent music discoursed during the day and evening.

Three rousing cheers were then given for Garfield and Arthur. Convention then adjourned, after which a Garfield and Arthur Club was organized.

During the afternoon a beautiful Garfield and Arthur flag was unfurled to the breeze.
