A brakeman on a south-bound freight train was killed between Pilot Knob and Ironton, last Sunday morning. His name was M. Newland, and his home Carondelet. From the testimony taken before the coroner's jury, it appears that he slipped and fell between the cars, to the track, and that he was caught by a brake beam and dragged over seventy yards over the ties. When his body was recovered after stopping the train, it was found to be fearfully mangled, and life was extinct. We do not care to dwell upon the horrible sight presented to those who viewed the remains. The morning was cold, and it is said the deceased was dancing to keep himself warm when he slipped and fell. The corpse was sent to Carondelet for interment.

We understand that some of the Republican leaders at Pilot Knob are telling the workmen that if Garfield is elected, several hundred additional men will be put to work on Shepherd Mountain; but that if Hancock is elected, "the works will stop" and the hands all be discharged! Now, we hardly know how to tackle such talk as this, except by telling the straight-out truth, viz.: that all such assertions are untrue, and that the parties who make them do so either through ignorance and inexperience or with purpose to deceive. If the bosses at the Knob want to vote the Republican ticket, that is one of their privileges no one will gainsay; and if any of the workmen want to support Hancock, we pre-eminently will be allowed to do so without annoyance. Some of the heaviest stockholders are Democrats, but we never heard of their attempting to influence the workmen, politically, and the bosses can take a safe "cue" from this.
