

Missouri Immigration. Perhaps, after a time, the outside world will learn the truth with regard to the floridly advertised domain of Kansas, and turn its attention to fairer lands that lies in happier climes. Here is Missouri, with hundreds of thousands of acres of as rich land as ever was turned over by the breaking plow. These acres have never been touched by agricultural implement, and are as inviting to the immigrant as they were to the pioneer—nay more so, as they are surrounded with civilization, and hedged on every side by available markets. A kindly hand is extended to all who may come to assist our people in developing the agricultural wealth which lies here, only awaiting the sympathetic touch of the husbandman to call forth its beauty and strength. We are glad to see that the inducements offered by the natural advantages of this State are beginning to receive the attention of the immigrant. By special request of Gov. Phelps and N. J. Morrison (president of Drury College) Secretary Renshaw of the Missouri Immigration Society recently sent one hundred copies of the Hand Book of Missouri to be distributed among the members of the National Council of the Congregational church in session in St. Louis. The president of the Council acknowledged their receipt in a letter of thanks.

By the first mail matter one morning last week forty requests for copies of the Hand Book were received from sixteen States.

An inquirer from Mason county, Ill., writes that after visiting Waterloo, Lafayette county, he has concluded with several other families to locate there.

A letter from Dickinson county, Kansas, written by a prominent banker, says that there will be a general exodus from that section, as nothing is talked of but immigration from there. The population is principally composed of Germans and Scandinavians, who have been egregiously deceived by the representations of the land agents. Missouri will be the objective point of the hegira, and at a general meeting of the dissatisfied emigrants, agents were appointed to come to Missouri and investigate lands.

The various counties have been asked to cooperate with the association in the publication of special circulars and hand books relative to themselves, and ten counties have already responded, the intention being to issue county hand books with township maps accompanying.

32,000 copies of the Hand Book have already been distributed, and 800 orders are now on the register waiting to be filled.


