Items of General News.

President Arthur has agreed to attend the Fourth of July celebration at Woodstock, Conn.

Ex-Cadet Whitaker, of West Point notoriety, has become a teacher in a Charleston, S. C., school.

Mr. Harris, the most successful orange-planter in Florida, has cleared \$63,000 on his crop of fruit this year.

A "Civil Service Institute," or cramming establishment, is already under way at Washington for civil service candidates.

The eight lines having their terminus at Boston have in the past year carried 41,129,285 passengers, and killed only eight.

Mr. Sergeant Ballantine, who visited Utah, is credited with the opinion that polygamy is an institution eminently suited to a new country.
