Mr. Joseph Davis died at the residence of his son, Mr. J. C. Davis, in Farmington, last Tuesday, Dec. 18th, 1883, aged 63 years, 8 months and 3 days. His funeral was preached at his son's residence by Rev. J. A. Creighton, and his remains were buried Wednesday afternoon in the Knights of Honor cemetery. Mr. Davis was born in Pennsylvania, April 16th, 1818. He was married to Miss Mrs. Angleton, who survives him, on November 31st, 1844, and moved to Missouri in April, 1868, settling at Pilot Knob in Iron county, where he resided until about two months ago, when he removed to Farmington. He was the father of nine children, seven of whom, (five boys and two girls) are still living. All of his family were present at the time of his death, except one son, who is in Texas.—*Farmington Times.*

Obituary.

EMILY, the beloved wife of C. R. Peck, departed this life, Sabbath, December 23d, at 7 o'clock A. M.

The stroke of the death angel cast a gloom, not alone upon the family who mourn the loss of wife and mother; but the whole community realize a sadness which robbed the Christmas season of its usual joyfulness, for Mrs. Peck was widely known and highly esteemed.

In her the needy found a friend, the afflicted, a sympathetic helper, the distressed, one who was always ready to afford her aid and comfort.

Except when sickness or distress called her from it, her home was her field of work and in it she proved an affectionate companion a tender and loving mother.

She was born at Fredericktown, Mo., February 13th, 1840. Attended college at Camden Point Platte Co., Mo. for two years, when that institution was under the supervision of Rev. U. B. Todd—and afterwards attended the Arcadia College then under the management of Rev. J. C. Berryman. She was united in marriage to Mr. C. R. Peck by Rev. H. M. Long, near Ironton, Oct. 10th, 1858. Her life was spent, (except her college term at Camden Point) in this community, and those who knew her best loved her most.

The circumstances of her death are unusually sad, not so much because of it occurring in the midst of Christmas times, but because of its following so closely the sudden death of little Frankie which occurred only last October the wounded hearts were not yet healed and sorrows tears were not yet dried when this second stroke came, tearing away one of the pillars of the domestic structure. A sorrowing husband and six motherless children wrapped in garments of sadness are left, the youngest being two years of age. Her aged father, still tarries upon times side of the grave, and brothers and sisters also suffer in the bereavement. But why lengthen this tribute to her memory? She reared, while here, a monument to her name, more lasting than written page or chiseled marble—engraved in living acts of kindness upon the hearts of those who were the objects of her regard.

Then while she sleeps beneath the sod let us who tarry heed the admonition God has given us, and be ready to meet the Lord when he shall come to call the dead from their tombs to meet him in the air.





Special to Tax-Payers on Personal Property.

To all such I take this method to warn and give notice, that if taxes are not paid on or before January 1st, 1884, I will be compelled to seize and sell property sufficient to satisfy all such taxes, as the county court will not allow me to return delinquent any personal tax that can be collected by the seizure and sale of personal property of such tax-payers. For the purpose of collecting the tax for 1883, I have complied with the law by giving notice and visiting each township in the county. I can now be found at my office in Ironton until the 1st day of January, 1884, for the purpose of collecting taxes, and hope the tax-payers will come forward and punctually pay such taxes, and thereby save themselves and me a great deal of trouble and annoyance. I can be found at my office in the courthouse at all times during the day, and every evening until nine o'clock, by those desiring to call and pay their taxes. W. A.
