

Tragically at Willow Springs.

Wm Hughes, a hotel keeper at Willow Springs, a town on the Gulf road, sixty miles east of Springfield, killed Dennis Dougherty, aged 35, a notorious gambler, who has been abusing Hughes for some time. Last Thursday Dougherty told Hughes to get his gun as the matter had to be settled. Hughes then procured a shot-gun and walked in front of the saloon where Dougherty was and told him to come and show himself. Dougherty did so and fired at Hughes with a pistol and then dodged back, when Hughes fired, riddling him with buckshot. Dougherty staggered forward and fell dead. Decayed and Hughes are men of families. Hughes was well to-do and in good standing, aged forty. Hughes was arrested and held for the examination. Domestic trouble is said to be the cause of the tragedy.
