

To Regulate Boarding House Butter. The buttermen, as was naturally to be expected, having secured an act of Congress for the suppression of oleomargarine, are now demanding more restrictive legislation of the same sort.

Nor need the line be drawn at butter. Boarding house coffee, boarding house milk, boarding house pie are all no better than they should be and are fit subjects for the exercise of Federal authority.

Some persons may think that in urging Congress to "perfect" the oleomargarine act, "so the provisions may extend to the keepers of hotels and boarding houses," Mr. Reall's alleged dairymen are joking fun at Congress. On the contrary, they are apparently quite serious.

High License. One of the main arguments used by prohibitionists is that the liquor law of Missouri is not enforced, and hence they argue that the state should have prohibition.

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Malden, Dunklin county, was the scene of a murder on the 10th inst., followed by a lynching on the 19th. The particulars of this horrible tragedy, where a good man, John McGilvrey, met his death by Bowman Paxton, we take from a Dexter special, as follows:

The difficulty, it seems, grew out of a game of dice between two parties. The facts, as near as can be learned, are that the parties throwing dice got into a row; one knocked the other down; the party making the assault was arrested. McGilvrey went to the jail and made some remarks to McGilvrey about him going on the bond of such a fellow as the man arrested. McGilvrey told Paxton to keep quiet and attend to his own business, as he didn't like him any too well, anyway.

The earthquake of 1811-12, which ended coincidentally with that which destroyed Caracas, Venezuela, extended from the mouth of the Ohio for 300 miles southwards. It was most violent about New Madrid, and left the sunken lands of that region on both sides of the Mississippi and Reel Foot lake as its permanent record.

The Charleston earthquake of 1844, accompanied by a tidal wave sixty feet in height, destroyed between 40,000 and 60,000 people within six minutes. The estimates of loss of life in the Lisbon earthquake vary from 40,000 to 60,000.

While the Charleston disaster was a dreadful calamity, when compared with the results of former earthquakes in America and for the most part in Europe, it was a fortunate escape when compared with the misfortunes of Lisbon and Caracas, and with many others which have desolated many populous country districts, in the civilized and barbarian world.
