Prof. Wiggins, of the Canada Meteorological Bureau, predicted, a year ago, the recent earthquake at Charleston, and now he foretells another which shall destroy to-day the cities of Mobile, Macon and New Orleans. The Prof. says this great catastrophe will be produced by a shifting of the earth's center of gravity which will be brought about by a conjunction of Jupiter, Saturn, Mars and the two satellites, one being the visible and the other the invisible moon which he claims to have discovered.

The following from the Dexter *Enterprise* is a sermon in itself. In these days of maudlin sentimentality, it is a very difficult matter to bring murderers to justice, and the consequence is, whole communities endeavor, for self-protection, to enforce the spirit of the law by breaking the letter thereof. "Twelve years ago this month," says the *Enterprise*, "a mob lynched George Koons at Kennett, Dunklin county, by hanging him to the cross-beam of a cotton-gin for murdering Hard Randall. Since that time until Sunday night no man has suffered death in that county for murder, notwithstanding fully a score of worse kind of murders have been committed there since the hanging of Koons. But from various causes the perpetrators of these crimes have always come off free or with a very light sentence in the penitentiary. The lynching Sunday night was the sequel to the murder of John McGilvray, at Malden, on Friday, the 10th, by Bowman Paxton. Monday was the time fixed for the preliminary examination of Paxton, before Squire J. J. Knight, at Malden. Yesterday Constable J. H. Bledsoe and D. R. Cox went to Kennett to bring him up for trial. As they were returning with him last night, between 10 and 11 o'clock, at a dark place in the road, about two miles and a half south of Malden their horses were seized by the bits and the hack in which they were traveling surrounded by armed men with leveled guns, and they demanded Paxton. At the same time the guards were seized and disarmed. Paxton was taken from the hack and the horses heads turned toward Clark-

ton, and Bledsoe and Cox notified to proceed in that direction and lose no time. Just what was done after the doomed man was taken charge of, before they hung him, will probably never be known, but the report reached Malden early Monday morning that Paxton had been mobbed, and soon quite a number of persons were hurrying down the road. His corpse was found suspended to the limb of a small oak tree, with his feet touching the ground. Two ropes were used in hanging him, an old and a new one. One was about his neck, the other partly around his face and neck. The appearances were that he had died hard."

### Approaching a Common Sense View of the Temperance Question.

It is strange to me that people who labor so assiduously for the furtherance of that scheme called Prohibition cannot, or will not, see their inconsistency. That their motives are generally good I will not nor am I prone to deny. It is merely the blind fanaticism which seems invariably to be entailed upon its devotees, that public condemn.

There seems to be, as it were, a strange fatality inherent in, and peculiar to this new Goddess, which infects all who worship at her shrine, and which is absurd in an inverse ratio to the general intelligence, and proportionate to the zeal of the victim. Let me be accused of making unsubstantiated assertions, I will give some data from indisputable authority. First. Most of, if not all, prohibitionists are professed Christians. As such they reflect upon the virtue of *Holy Writ* as a guide and as a law. Well let us see; they all claim to be temperance people. They think they have a monopoly of the "temperance," or in other terms that that word was made especially for them. But, fortunately, the Bible and Webster come to the rescue of the "King's English," and interpose an immutable barrier to the prostitution of it to such unnatural purposes. Webster defines temperance as meaning "moderation," or, virtually, a happy mean, without restricting it to a reference (as they would have it) to a indulgence in "red liquor," any more than he does to the same in speech, or thought. Now the great Apostle Paul says, "Be temperate in all things." In order to make doubly sure, that he does not leave particular reference to spirituous liquor, let us refer to another passage in which he says, "Take a little wine for thy stomach's sake," (a command which I fear, is more often and more readily obeyed than the more divine (?) one given in the "Golden Rule"), thereby implying that there is temperance even in what they would term "intemperance." I appeal to any lover of good English if this is not an anomaly that is not permissible in the good rendering thereof.

Some may say that this is a mere technicality. But I think that it is a matter of importance. It is potent to any person of good judgment that a teacher, to be successful, must teach by example as well as by precept. That being the case, how can they expect to teach the exercise of temperance in the indulgence of the appetite for alcoholic drink, by intemperance of action, thought, word, and pen, on their part? By attempting to do so, they act without calm forthrightness. In their teachings they continually set forth the mortified fact that some of our smartest men, and those who have the most brilliant intellects, often fall victims to this fell destroyer. This, true, would not a moment's thought tell them that their opponents could see their inconsistency, and another thought would tell them that no man receives from an inconsistent teacher, no matter how good his principles. That leads us to see that there are two alternatives. Either they work without judgment, or they assume a contempt for the perception of their opponents, that is without a shade of warrant in the light of their own admissions. From this we can but deduce the conclusion that their methods are unchristian, and that their virulent attacks are but the vain ebullitions of half frenzied fanatics. I do not say this to injure the temperance cause; God forbid that the talent he has given me should ever be misdirected to such an unworthy purpose. My object is to stimulate thinking minds to unbiased inquiry for a practical and common-sense method of dealing with this vital question. The next article will treat of its impracticability. QUAKER.

### Out at Last.

A plain but most intelligible and conclusive explanation of the Mugwumps is contained in the last number of *Harpers Weekly*. It was the outcome of a letter lately published in the *Enterprise* asking the Mugwumps to give up being amateur guerrillas of politics and make of themselves square Democrats. The *Post* opposed the idea, and *Harpers Weekly* agrees with the *Post*, and the ground of its opposition to complete fusion throws the whitest kind of a light upon the whole Mugwump enterprise. In the judgment of the Journal of Civilization the reason why the Independents did not immediately after the election of Mr. Cleveland throw themselves into an indistinguishable union with his party is indicated in this: "If the President had called Mugwumps to office, and if the Democratic leaders had welcomed them as none the less Democrats, though they had always opposed the Democratic party, an irresistible Administration party would have arisen."

It was because Mr. Cleveland did not do this satisfactorily, thinks *Harpers Weekly*, that the Mugwumps are not to-day Democrats. So we see that if the Mugwumps had got the offices and the Democracy had suddenly been converted into a party ruled and directed by the Independents, and of which the Independents enjoyed the rewards and honors, Mr. Cleveland's special body guard would have stuck to the Democracy for good.

A striking feature of this declaration is its simplicity. The Mugwumps want to run the Administration and they want the offices as a means of running it, if for nothing else. That is very natural. It is the very essence of Democracy.

But by the Mugwump on the outside it is called the spoil system.—N. Y. Sun.
